I. RATIONALE

This report on compensation contains a revision of the 2015 guidelines, "Compensation and Benefits for Pastors, Associates in Ministry, Diaconal Ministers and Deaconesses for the Central/Southern Illinois Synod." It is suggested at those who are responsible for the compensation of Pastors, Associates in Ministry, Diaconal Ministers, and Leaconesses use this report as an aid in determining what fair and equitable compensation is for church workers. In addition to this report congregations may wish to consult other publications on compensation for church workers.

As congregations and church workers prepare their budgets for the coming year, this subcommittee would offer a few suggestions or principles that have guided this report. They are:

1. **The Mutual Ministry Principle:** Lutheran theology affirms that ministry belongs to the whole body of Christ. It is recommended that each congregation establish a Mutual Ministry Committee to review and appraise the congregation's ministry. This committee can make salary recommendations to the congregation and advocate the needs and concerns of the church worker. In addition, members of this committee can relate and share the needs and concerns of the parish to the pastor, associate in ministry, diaconal minister or deaconess.

When it comes to compensation everyone worries about money! Pastors and church workers worry about their finances in the same way that church boards worry about funding their budgets. Should matters of compensation become irritants, it is important to seek qualified help. When problems arise, either for the congregation or the church worker, consult the bishop's office for help and guidance.

Congregations believe and trust in their pastors and church workers. Pastors and church workers love their ministries and congregations. Matters of compensation should never become adversarial and harm good relationships that exist in parishes.

2. The Information Principle: Guidelines or recommendations can be useful only if they are understood. Those responsible for compensation in the parish need good, reliable information. Hopefully, this report can fulfill such a need. As congregations work through this report, they will learn more about what is expected and necessary for good compensation planning. It is also recommended that congregations stay current with the tax laws and recent changes in the tax laws. Sound tax strategies and planning can maximize the compensation of church workers.

3. The Cost of Ministry Principle: It costs money, time, and effort for a congregation to carry on an effective ministry. The cost of ministry is not the same as the remuneration given to the pastor, associate in ministry, diaconal minister, or deaconess. Remuneration or compensation is that amount of money that is paid to the church worker. This generally would include the base salary and housing allowance. These items accrue to the benefit of the worker. The cost of ministry includes all costs that a congregation incurs by virtue of having church worker. This generally would include professional expenses, worker compensation insurance, car reimbursement, medical, disability, survivor and retirement plans. The cost of ministry is substantially higher than the compensation that church workers receive.

When preparing a budget, congregations are urged to separate the cost of ministry from the compensation paid to church workers.

All guidelines have limitations. Every issue of salary and compensation cannot be determined or settled in this report. Congregations, pastors, associates in ministry, diaconal ministers, deaconesses and church workers are encouraged to talk and negotiate with each other as mature Christian brothers and sisters. It is hoped that these guidelines will serve as an aid for such dialogue.

4. Due to the complex nature of the tax code as it relates to clergy and lay professionals, the subcommittee for leadership support strongly recommends the use of a tax professional who is knowledgeable about such matters in the preparation of tax returns.

II. UPDATE IN THE FORMAT OF THE GUIDELINES

For 2016, the base salary guideline is given as a salary range for the number of years of service. Also, while the guidelines chart does not extend past 35 years of experience, we certainly do recommend that there be salary increases for church staff with more than 35 years of experience.

III. EXPLANATION OF THE COMPONENTS OF COMPENSATION

Note: All components apply to pastors and other rostered leaders, unless indicated otherwise.

1. Base (Basic Salary)

Direct monetary compensation or salary has been divided into levels, based on experience or years in the ministry. Each level provides a range of salary. Additional flexibility for the congregation in determining salary relates other factors for consideration. Such factors might include:

- a. Two point parish add 3% to 5% of base.
- b. Senior Pastor with staff add 3% to 5% of base.
- c. Advanced degree add 3% to 5% of base.
- d. Merit for exceptional work add 3% to 5% of base.
- e. Second career experience Congregations are encouraged to recognize the previous work experience of second career church workers. Congregations may fully or partially recognize previous experience in determining the base salary, but some credit should be given in computing salary.
- f. Size or work load Some congregations have special situations which merit increased salary. Some church workers carry heavy workloads which merit increased compensation. Normally, however, a congregation should increase the staff, rather than the compensation when the workload becomes too great for an individual.

Congregations are free to determine which of the above factors merit increases in the base salary. There may be other factors, which have not been considered in this report. The range in each level allows for flexibility, within the parameters established by years of service in the ministry.

2. Social Security Allowance

Social Security & Medicare Tax Allowance

While most clergy are considered employees for income tax purposes, they are considered self-employed for purposes of Self Employment Contributions Act (SECA) taxes, which means they carry the full burden of those taxes themselves.

An organization may choose to pay an amount directly to a pastor to use toward her or his Social Security and Medicare tax. Providing the allowance helps the pastor avoid being at a disadvantage when compared to a lay employee, who pays only the employee's share of the Social Security and Medicare tax.

Calculating Social Security & Medicare Tax Allowance:

Consider increasing Compensation Using the Same Combined Employer Social Security/Medicare Tax Rate as Lay Employees (7.65%) This approach mirrors the manner in which Social Security and Medicare taxes are allocated between employers and lay employees.

Reporting Social Security & Medicare Tax Allowance:

- For tax purposes: the IRS considers Social Security and Medicare allowance as taxable income to the pastor. Any allowance is typically reported as part of the taxable income in box 1 on a IRS Form W-2; not in boxes 2 or 4.
- For benefit purposes: Portico Benefit Services includes any Social Security and Medicare Allowance in the defined compensation used for calculating retirement, health, and other benefit contributions.
- For organizational budgeting purposes: it may still be helpful to report Social Security and Medicare Tax Allowance as a separate accounting item for planning and interpretive purposes.

Additional Notes:

The actual SECA tax liability must be calculated by the pastor at the time of filing his or her federal tax return, and involves numerous adjustments and calculations. These calculations are the pastor's responsibility, and not the congregation's.

In some instances, associates in ministry, deaconesses, and diaconal ministers may be subject to SECA taxes on their ministerial earnings. In these situations, congregations should consider providing a Social Security and Medicare Tax Allowance.

The current SECA tax rate of 15.3% was established in 1990. It was temporarily reduced by 2% in 2011 and 2012, but returned to 15.3% in 2013.

3. Housing

Note: Associates in ministry, diaconal ministers, and deaconesses are not to be included in this component. Two housing alternatives are considered below:

a) Parsonage: When a parsonage is provided, the congregation should pay for utilities and maintenance. The fair rental value of the parsonage is included in calculation SECA taxes (see above). In addition, defined compensation for benefit purposes is increased by 30% when reported to Portico Benefit Services. Congregations providing a parsonage must also consider a housing equity allowance.

Housing Equity Allowance:

- The ELCA suggests that congregations provide pastors with a "housing equity" allowance if they live in parsonage. These funds can grow over time, and can make home ownership possible for pastors who are retiring or moving to a new call where a parsonage is not provided.
- The ELCA recommends that either 3% of the pastor's total compensation or 5% to 10% of the base salary be designated and set aside as a housing equity allowance. Regardless of which figure is chosen, the congregation and pastor need to negotiate a figure that is mutually acceptable.
- The tax treatment, legal ownership, and management of housing equity funds can be complex, and may result in significant unplanned income and SECA tax liabilities for the pastor if not handled carefully.

Portico Benefit Services offers a convenient way to establish and manage housing equity contributions with simplified ownership and minimal tax consequences. These contributions are placed in the pastor's ELCA Retirement Plan account and are configured as Housing Equity contributions for tax purposes. These funds and any investment earnings can be withdrawn at any time, will not be subject to SECA taxes, and may not be subject to income taxes and early-withdrawal penalties when used to provide a home.

b) Housing Allowance: Some congregations provide their pastor with a housing allowance in place of a parsonage. This figure should reflect the realistic fair rental value of a home in the community, and would normally include such costs as insurance, utilities, taxes, maintenance, improvements, and furnishings. This figure needs to be reviewed and adjusted annually.

A housing allowance designation provides a special tax benefit for the pastor. According to IRS Publication 517, the pastor may exclude from gross income the smallest of:

- Eligible expenses used to provide a home
- The amount officially designated as a housing allowance, or
- · The fair rental value of the home, including furnishings and utilities
- c) Housing Resolution: To assist you and your congregation in this process, the following is offered as a sample. IRS regulations require that this resolution be adopted by the church council on an annual basis and be recorded in church council minutes.

4. The ELCA Pension and Other Benefits Program

The ELCA Pension and Other Benefits Program helps plan members live well for life, by offering a benefit program that includes health, flexible spending, retirement, disability, life insurance, and other benefits. By helping each other live well, we strengthen our ministries and our communities, and are better equipped to carry out God's work. For more than 25 years, Portico Benefit Services has used foundational principles guided by the ELCA Philosophy of Benefits to design a bundled benefit program that aligns with ELCA values and affirms the importance of benefits for the health and wellness of this church.

As outlined by the ELCA Philosophy of Benefits, health benefits should include coverage for the plan member and immediate family members of rostered leaders and lay employees. Although employers are expected to pay the majority of benefit costs through plan contributions, plan members are expected to participate in the benefit costs through plan design and features.

Benefit Program Overview

a. ELCA Health Benefits Plan — Health benefits including medical and mental health, dental, prescription drugs, support services, and wellness programs Sponsoring organizations can choose between four ELCA-Primary health benefit options:

Platinum+: Lowest deductible and out-of-pocket limit

Gold+: Low deductible and out-of-pocket limit

Silver+: High deductible and low out-of-pocket limit paired with HSA Bronze+: Highest deductible and out-of-pocket limit paired with HSA

The ELCA Church Council recommends Gold+ to preserve a cost structure that works well for plan members and supports the call process nationally.

If an organization selects Platinum+ or Gold+, or if plan members choose to buy up to one of those options, they can make pretax contributions to a health FSA, which they can use to pay for eligible health care expenses. If an organization selects Silver+ or Bronze+ they'll also select one of three HSA contribution amounts to offset members' higher deductible and out-of-pocket costs:

Level A: \$1,200 single/\$2,400 family Level B: \$600 single/\$1,200 family

Level C: \$0 single/\$0 family (no contribution)

Note: By not contributing to plan members' HSAs, employers put more of the health care cost burden on them.

Sponsored members may waive health benefits for themselves or their eligible spouse or eligible same-gender partner as long as they can prove they have other valid health coverage, as defined by Portico. If a sponsored plan member waives health benefits for themselves, they must also waive health benefits for their spouse or eligible same-gender partner and children.

Plan members or family members who are eligible for Medicare will have ELCA Medicare-Primary health benefits to supplement Medicare benefits.

- b. ELCA Flexible Benefits Plan Health flexible spending accounts (FSA), dependent (day) care accounts FSA, health savings accounts (HSA), limited-purpose flexible spending accounts (FSA), and personal wellness accounts, which can be used to pay for eligible expenses Both sponsoring employers and plan members can make contributions to an HSA. Members who have waived ELCA health benefits can participate in an FSA.
- **c. ELCA Retirement Plan** Sponsoring employers and eligible plan members contribute to save money for plan members' retirement
 - i. Employer retirement contributions: minimum of 10% for clergy and rostered lay in congregations; some members, based on age, may have a minimum of 11% or 12%
 - ii. Employer housing equity: contributions are not to replace salary but can be used to voluntary increase retirement contributions or to build equity for a pastor who lives in a parsonage
 - iii. Employee pretax retirement contributions: plan members can contribute up to IRS contribution limits

- d. ELCA Disability Benefits Plan Provides eligible disabled plan members a monthly income, health benefits, life insurance, and retirement account contributions after a two-month waiting period. Eligibility for benefits is determined by Portico's benefits administrator.
- e. ELCA Survivor Benefits Plan Life insurance to help plan members' beneficiaries with financial obligations in the event of a death.

i. Employer-paid basic group life insurance for sponsored plan members

The opportunity for eligible plan members to purchase supplemental life insurance for themselves, and dependent life insurance for eligible spouses, eligible same-gender partners, and children

Annual Open Enrollment

Each fall, each sponsoring employer must make a selection with Portico for the ELCA-Primary health benefit option they will offer their sponsored plan members for the following year. Even if they'll be providing the same ELCA health benefit option as the current year, they still must confirm that option.

More Information

It is expected that congregations will sponsor pastors and their families in the ELCA Pension and Other Benefits Program. Congregations are permitted to make additional contributions to the ELCA Retirement Plan of the ELCA Pension and Other Benefits Program. These contributions are tax deferred. The Professional Leadership Committee encourages our congregations to fund Retirement Plan contributions at 12%.

Sponsored Couples

If both members of a couple are sponsored in the ELCA Pension and Other Benefits Program, they are a sponsored couple. Most sponsored couples choose to enroll in health benefits as a couple, because it typically reduces health benefit costs for both the family and sponsoring employers. As a couple, they are able to manage health benefits as a family, but manage other benefits — like tax-advantaged accounts and retirement accounts — individually.

Each sponsoring employer's health contribution is calculated separately as if each person was the only sponsored member of the family, based on defined compensation, age, geographic location, and health coverage level. The cost is then divided in half to determine each employer's contribution. If the plan member chooses to buy up to a higher-value health benefit option, their buy-up cost is calculated separately for each as if they were the only sponsored plan member of the family, and takes into account their defined compensation, age, geographic location, and health coverage level. The buy-up cost is divided in half to determine the amount of payroll withholding from the employee's paychecks. The same calculation is used to determine payroll withholding for the other spouse or eligible same-gender partner. Each employer pays the full cost of retirement, disability, and survivor benefit contributions for the plan member it sponsors.

5. Professional Expenses Reimbursement

- a. Automobile Reimbursement: It is usual for a congregation to set an actual cost-per-mile reimbursement, using the IRS mileage figure. (e.g. \$.57.5 per mile for 2015 or current IRS rate.) Some congregations may lease or own a car, which the church worker uses for congregational business. Still other congregations set a fixed annual rate for an "automobile allowance."
 - For tax purposes this report recommends that congregations use the reimbursement method. Allowances are taxable income; straight reimbursements of costs are not. Professional expenses which are not reimbursed are normally deductible on Schedule A where they are subject to the 2% rule, i.e. only the amount that exceeds 2% of one's adjusted gross income (1040, line 31) is deductible.
- b. Books and Other Published Resources: It is appropriate for the congregation to reimburse the church worker for books, magazines, professional journals, and other published materials.
- c. Malpractice-Liability Insurance: Congregations are encouraged to provide this coverage for all church workers.
- d. Other Professional Expenses: Congregations should reimburse the pastor and all church workers for expenses incurred in the performance of their duties. Some examples would include the fees charged for the Professional Leadership Conference, parking costs, dues for professional associations, telephone, synod assembly, etc.

6. Continuing Education.

The congregation should negotiate allotted time for a pastor to continue his/her education. The ELCA Congregational and Synodical Mission Unit recommends twenty-five classroom hours per year. This report recommends that pastors and congregation councils work out a mutually agreed upon plan of study and file a covenant with the bishop's office. It is expected that the congregation, the church worker, and the church all share in the cost of continuing education.

We recommend congregation councils give serious consideration to Sabbatical or Clergy Renewal Leave as part of the compensation package. A sabbatical leave is a time for release from normal duties in order that the Pastor may devote time to renewal. It is an integral and important part of an overall strategy for enhancing the mission of the congregation through pastor renewal, enrichment, study, spiritual growth, travel, personal and family time, skill development, and/or research. Sabbatical leaves can be of any duration decided upon by the congregation. For those congregations interested in providing sabbatical or clergy renewal time a resource document is available on line or from the Synod Office. It is entitled: Resource Guide for Sabbatical or Clergy Renewal for The Central/Southern Illinois Synod of the ELCA.

7. Leave Time

1. Continuing Education:

Two weeks per year, which may be accumulated up to six weeks over a three

year period.

2. Regular vacation:

Minimum of four weeks with Sundays per year.

Additional Sundays may be granted.

3. Sick leave:

Full salary until ELCA Disability Benefits Plan takes effect; eligibility rules

apply. See Letter of Call or Appointment for specific details.

4. Parental leave:

Maternal--6 weeks with full salary.

Paternal--2 weeks with full salary.

Parents who are adopting children should be granted the same amount of leave time. Parental leave may also be granted at other times, e.g. during

times of severe illness, trauma, or death.

5. Personal leave:

As mutually agreed upon.

Congregations are encouraged to establish a policy of emergency leave, before an emergency arises.

PROFESSIONAL EXPENSES

1. Automobile Expenses:

a. Fixed monthly amount or a cost-per-mile reimbursement.

b. Congregation owns or leases a car.

2. Continuing Education:

Recommendation is \$1,000, minimum recommendation is \$700 per year. Continuing education time of two weeks per year, which may be accumulated up to six weeks over a three-year period, is recommended.

3. Professional Books and Journals: \$200 per year.

4. Insurance, et al.: includes malpractice and worker comprehensive coverages.

WHEREAS.

our Lord Jesus Christ prayed for the unity of the people of God (that they may be completely one) and that they be filled with the love of God to give testimony to the

world, who does not know the God through Christ Jesus; and

WHEREAS.

a central document to Lutherans is the *Augsburg Confession*. Article VII of the *Augsburg Confession* states that "the true unity of the church" is present where the gospel is rightly preached and sacraments rightly administered. The ELCA is committed to this model of full communion as an authentic expression of Christian unity; and

WHEREAS,

in Churchwide Assembly the ELCA has formed full communion partnerships with the Episcopal Church (since 1999), the Presbyterian Church USA (since 1997), the Reformed Church in America (since 1997), the United Church of Christ (since 1997), the Moravian Church (since 1999), and the United Methodist Church (since 2009); and

WHEREAS.

for the ELCA, the characteristics of full communion relationships imply that the gospel allows variety and flexibility in carrying out the theology and mission that we share. These characteristics stress that the church act ecumenically for the sake of the world, not for itself alone. They will include at least the following, some of which exist at earlier stages:

- common confessing of the Christian faith
- mutual recognition of Baptism and a sharing of the Lord's Supper, allowing for joint worship and an exchangeability of members
- mutual recognition and availability of ordained ministers to the service of all, subject to the disciplinary regulations of other denominations
- common commitment to evangelism, witness and service
- means of common decision-making on critical common issues of faith and life
- mutual lifting of any condemnations that exist between denominations; and

WHEREAS,

full communion allows full participation in and full acceptance of the ministries of the other ecumenical partners; and

WHEREAS,

there are many ways outside of sharing clergy that churches in full communion can relate and cooperate with each other; and

WHEREAS,

the Central/Southern Illinois Synod, ELCA, has not developed a mission and ministry plan with our ecumenical partners in our area or actively implemented such a plan; THEREFORE BE IT THAT

RESOLVED, the Bishop of the Central/Southern Illinois Synod as the Synod's Chief Ecumenical Officer, appoint an Ecumenical Committee and Chairperson to oversee development of an expansive vision and strategy for how the synod as a whole can develop a deeper cooperative ministry with its ecumenical partners to possibly include joint convocations, assemblies, committees, and the like, and report on this strategy to the Synod Council in 2015 and the Synod Assembly by 2016; and BE IT FURTHER

RESOLVED that, the Central/Southern Illinois Synod memorialize its congregations to begin now cooperating with and engaging in ministry, beside sister churches, especially those officially deemed ecumenical partners in full communion relationships with the ELCA; and BE IT FINALLY

WHEREAS throughout his ministry, Jesus and his followers sought to embrace and re-incorporate the forgotten, the marginalized, and the excluded; for example:

Bartimaeus, the blind man on the side of the road (Luke 18:35-43)

The man with paralysis carried by four friends (Matthew 9:1-6)

The woman suffering from blood flow (Mark 5:25-34)

The ten men with leprosy (Luke 17:11-19)

The man with the withered hand (Mark 3:1-15)

...the list of examples could go on and on ...

and we believe the Church should be a community where people of all abilities are affirmed and appreciated and encouraged to participate,

the ELCA social message about "Human Disability" www.elca.org/disabilities message states: "Just as in Christ there is no longer Jew nor Greek, there is no longer slave nor free, there is no longer male and female" (Galatians 3:28 NRSV), so also in Christ there are neither people with disabilities nor people without disabilities and encourages congregations to be inclusive and accessible to those who live with physical, sensory, intellectual, mental and developmental challenges; and

we confess that too often we have intentionally and unintentionally placed physical, social, and relational barriers that have limited our welcome to others with special needs, and that we may have injured them and their families in this process. "People with disabilities are much less likely to attend religious services compared to people without disabilities, 50% versus 57% respectively." (N.O.D. Harris Survey 2010)

THEREFORE BE IT

RESOLVED that the Central/Southern Illinois Synod (C/SIS) develop a Definitely-Abled Advocacy group within our synod; and therefore be it

RESOVLED that one Sunday each year be designated as "Definitely-Abled Sunday" within the C/SIS;



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Bishop's Report to the Assembly

Bishop S. John Roth Central/Southern Illinois Synod Evangelical Lutheran Church in America

Our three-year lectionary cycle includes Jesus' words, "As the Father has sent me, so I am sending you," in Year A as a reading on the Sunday after Easter. You know that worship attendance tends to swing low after the crowds of Easter Sunday. On Easter Sunday, we boisterously celebrate what blessings we get to enjoy because Jesus is risen: God loves us with a love stronger than death; God forgives us; Jesus can be trusted when he says that he will take care of us; Jesus' resurrection foreshadows our resurrection. This Easter joy in what God did and continues to do, trading our unrighteousness for Jesus' righteousness, purely out of God's grace, is always first and foremost.

But then, I wonder. Might Jesus' message "As the Father has sent me, so I am sending you," be why some people who come to church on Easter don't come back the following Sunday? Jesus does not say, "As the Father has made my life comfortable, so I am making your life comfortable." Jesus does not say, "As the Father has made me self-satisfied, so I am making you self-satisfied." No. Jesus says, "As the Father has sent me, so I send you."

This appearance of the risen Jesus to his disciples is a distinctive commissioning event. Matthew and Luke also have commissionings. In the biblical narratives by both Matthew (28:20) and Luke (24:47-48; Acts 1:8), the risen Jesus commissions his disciples to go into the world – you are probably most familiar with Matthew's, where Jesus says, "Go, make disciples, baptizing them and teaching them." In John's ospel, Jesus makes the special point that the Christian community inherits Jesus' work – in a sense, takes up Jesus' mantel. God the Father sent Jesus; parallel to that, Jesus sends us.

About 15 years ago, I attended a church growth conference in Orange County, CA. It was at Saddleback Church (Saddleback is not a Lutheran church), one of the fastest growing churches in the country – if not the fastest growing. I went there wanting not to like the senior minister at Saddleback, Pastor Rick Warren. It had everything to do with jealousy. He is one of those "too good to be true" stories: in 15 years his church grew from two families to an average weekend worship attendance over 10,000. Who can measure up to that? But I came away impressed; he is good, and genuine. This sticks with me. Early on in their history, Pastor Warren said to his church,

Have you ever wondered why God leaves us here on earth, with all its pain, sorrow, and sin, after we (have become Christians)? Why doesn't God just zap us immediately to heaven and spare us from all this? After all, we can worship, fellowship, pray, sing, hear God's Word, and even have fun in heaven. In fact, there are only two things you can't do in heaven that you can do on earth: sin, and witness. . . . (W)hich of these two (do you) think Christ left us here to do? We have a mission on earth. (*Purpose Driven Church*, p. 116)

Rick Warren is right about that: we have a mission on earth. There are other aspects of Pastor Warren's teaching that make me wince, but he is right about that.

Our assembly speaker, Dr. James Thomas, and our assembly preacher, Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton, will draw us into further reflection on what it means to be sent as Jesus was sent. How good it is to look forward to this.

I will continue to visit as many of you as I can, in your congregations and in your communities. I find great joy in worshiping with you, joining in your special gatherings, celebrating congregational anniversaries, installing your pastors, dreaming about missional ministry, and exploring creative ways to turn challenges into God-given opportunities wherever Christ is sending us.

Synod Council

The Synod Council meets four times a year. Among its responsibilities, the Synod Council tends to be the vision and purpose of the synod, acts on recommendations regarding the rosters of the synod (for example, "on leave from call" requests and "retirement status" requests), oversees the ministries of our synod committees and synod staff, recommends budgets to the Synod Assembly, and advises the bishop. You can peruse the minutes of the Synod Council meetings in the Assembly Reports (available on the synod website).

I encourage us as a Synod Council, as an ongoing exercise, to look at our purpose and goals as a synod and as a Synod Council. This began with lifting up three foundational questions: Who are we? Why are we here? What then shall we do?

To take this conversation further, in 2014 I asked the Synod Council to take up two questions that directly concern the Synod Council's leadership role in the synod. 1) What three things does the synod do that, if those three things do not get done, nothing else matters? 2) How do we address doing those things in light of our synod's capacity to doing these things? When the Synod Council brainstormed on the first of these two questions, we came up with a list of more than 20 things that members of the Synod Council considered to be indispensable functions of the synod. Our assigned task was to identify and organize priorities for the synod. Following conversation at subsequent meetings and completion of forced ranking surveys between meetings, with the assistance of a Synod Council ad hoc working group, the Synod Council arrived at a consensus on three key items that speak to our "being," i.e., that underpin all that we do as a synod, and three key items that speak to our "doing" regarding prioritizing what the synod is about. The working group observed that Synod Council responses predominately focused on synodical engagement with congregations rather than Churchwide or public ministry. Still, there is no suggestion here that any of the tasks identified but not included as a key item are without merit or importance.

Being, underpinning all we do:

- Discern and articulate the Spirit of Christ.
- 2. Remind us of who we are (Lutheran, evangelists, spiritually empowered) and who we are not.
- 3. Envision our Mission for sustainable growth and discipleship.

Doing:

- 1. Support and encourage effective congregational leadership by putting pastors in the pulpit and providing leadership in time of crisis.
- 2. Facilitate collective decision making by convening and gathering the gifts of the synod.
- 3. Communicate connectedness and caring with congregations and our broken world.

These are basic guiding values/priorities/goals. Listing them is not intended to limit or constrain our synod's collective programs, ministries, mission projects, or educational activities. These value/priorities/goals give guidance for what we attend to first, what we take particular care not to neglect, and how we engage in everything from youth ministry to candidacy committee to companion synod relationships. (I have attached as an appendix a list of other tasks initially listed by Synod Council members as vital to what we do as a synod.)

The Synod Council reflected on these key items at its March 2015 meeting by breaking into small groups and envisioning concretely what it might look like if the synod is fruitfully being and doing these key items.

This will be an ongoing conversation in the Synod Council. It is not the intent of the Synod Council to create a "top-down" directive for committees, conferences, or congregations to implement. Rather, our hope is that this conversation would expand to committees, conferences, and congregations so that we might refine our vision of who we are, why we are here, and what we then do. In other words, our hope is to expand this conversation so that we may share in the joy of being church together as we glorify God, build up the body ϵ Christ, and proclaim Christ in the world.

Synod Notes

My report includes the statistical information on the synod that you will find available on the synod website: www.csis-elca.org The statistical information includes the current number of congregations in the synod and the transitions of rostered leaders over the course of the past year.

As I write this, we have 15 active call processes in which a full-time pastor is sought and a Ministry Site Profile has been submitted by the congregation council; I anticipate three of them having called pastors by the time you read this. Of the remaining 12, four are interviewing nominees. Congregations in an additional five active call processes are working on submitting their Ministry Site Profile.

Companion Synod Relations - Malagasy Lutheran Church

We relate to two synods (or dioceses) of the Malagasy Lutheran Church, which is the Lutheran church body in Madagascar: the Ambovombe Synod and the Ft. Dauphin Synod, both of which are located in the southern region of Madagascar. Thanks to voluntary contributions, we continue to support the regional seminary in Bezaha, the Manatantely Bible School in Ft. Dauphin, and the Mahavelo Bible School in Ambovombe.

Most significant for the development of our companion synod relationships this past year was the visit a delegation made to Madagascar. Making the trip were Pr. Wayne Shelksohn (who shouldered the responsibility for organizing the trip), Ms. Jeanne Berg, Ms. Linda Ericsson, Ms. Connie Frankenfeld, Pr. Ruth Kaden, Pr. Harlan Kaden, Pr. Kathryn Montira, as well as my wife, Kris, and me. Thank you" to the individuals, congregations, conferences, and the Central/Southern Illinois Synod Women of the ELCA for financial support for this trip. No synod benevolence dollars were used. Those who made the trip themselves made a substantial financial investment in it.

I. Why the C/SIS went to our Malagasy companion synods:

- 1. We went and foremost because the Malagasy Lutheran Church invited us to do so. And we thank them for that. When President Modeste was in the United States and we were in meetings together, President Modeste emphasized that for a full and healthy relationships, people need to see one another personally. Malagasy Lutherans in the southern areas of Madagascar and we American Lutherans have a relationship in Christ that has been going for 127 years begun in 1888. We cherish that relationship, and we thank President Modeste for reinforcing the value getting together has for our relationship in Christ. We want to be together with them, and we are grateful to God that they want to be together with us. We went because they invited us to do so to explore how we might improve our partnership in the gospel.
- 2. Second, we went to learn about our Malagasy sisters and brothers in Christ, to learn about their faith, about their daily life, about their joys and their sorrows, their challenges and their victories; we went to learn how Jesus Christ shapes and fashions their life; we went to see the effect of God's grace through Jesus Christ on you.
- 3. There is one more reason to mention. We went hoping to learn not only <u>about Malagasy Lutherans</u>; we went hoping to learn <u>from them</u>. We wanted to come back to the United States and ask ourselves, "What did we learn, what did we experience in Madagascar that can help us glorify God and build up the body of Christ here in the United States?"
- II. Highlights of our itinerary -- where we went:
 - ♦ We left for Madagascar on Monday morning, August 11, and arrived in the capital city of Antananarivo late Tuesday night, August 12.
 - Thursday, August 14: Visit to Toby Fiadanana (Peace)
 - ◆ Friday, August 15: Conversation with Malagasy Lutheran Church General Secretary Samuel Georges and presented him with the etched glass gift from our synod to the Malagasy Lutheran Church.
 - Saturday, August 16: Flew to Tolagnaro (Fort Dauphin). Conversation with leadership of the Fort Dauphin Synod including Synod President Pastor Rakotondravony Soloson, Vice President Pastor Monja, and Treasurer Perline Endor, as well as the General Secretaries for the Sunday School Department, the Revival Movement, the Women's Department (Evangelist Masy), the Manantantely Bible School, and the Youth Department. We presented President Soloson with the etched glass gift from our synod to the Malagasy Lutheran Church.
 - Sunday, August 17: Worshipped with the church in the village of Elarina, with lunch afterwards. In the
 evening, we attended a concert of choirs at a church in Tolagnaro.
 - Monday, August 18: Conversation with leadership of the Amobovombe Androy Synod: President Pastor Elia; Pastor Gideon (GS of the Literacy program); Mrs. Macrine (General Secretary of the Women's Department and a Bible School teacher); Mr. Mbola (Synod Controller). In the evening, we had supper together with these companion synod leaders.
 - ◆ Tuesday, August 19: With President Soloson, Vice President Monja, and Pastor Gasy, we visited the Lutheran Hospital in Manambaro, the church in Manambaro, the Bible School in Manatantely, the Toby Nenilava, and the office of the Fort Dauphin Synod Department of Agriculture and Farming. In the evening, we were treated to supper with leaders of the Fort Dauphin Synod at the home of President Soloson.
 - Wednesday, August 20: Flew back to Antananarivo.
 - Thursday, August 21: Our group met to debrief our experiences and to plan communicating our companion synod relationship in our synod. Late this night, we began our trip back to the United States.

When it was formed in 1950, the Malagasy Lutheran Church counted 180,000 members; today it numbers roughly 4 million members, and continues to experience rapid growth. Malagasy Lutherans credit much of the Malagasy Lutheran Church's rapid growth to the holistic healing ministry of the revival movement.

The Malagasy Lutheran Church has a deep commitment to providing a comprehensive education and training for its church leadership including catechists, shepherds, pastors and female theologians. These leaders are trained in a network of regional seminaries and Bible schools. The church also operates numerous schools at the primary and secondary levels. There are also schools and ministries dedicated to working with people who are blind or hearing impaired.

In our formal meetings with the companion synod delegations and ministry spokespersons, they told us about themselves: their church structures, their programs, their activities, their ministries. Every ministry, every program area, every department has an evangelism emphasis. Also, they emphasized their commitment to sustainability, self-sufficiency, and accountability.

Both synods fervently request our prayers. They emphasized this multiple times. I encourage all Synod Assembly attenders to do this in your private prayer life. Also, please go back to your congregations and conferences and work out opportunities for any of us who visited our companion synods to come to your church or conference to talk about the life and ministry of the Lutheran Church in Madagascar, to explore ways we might share in their ministry, and to consider where we might learn from them.

You may find out more about our trip and our companion synods at either of the two forum opportunities during this assembly.

"As the Father has sent me, so I am sending you."

As we gather in assembly, the promises of God continue to guide us, our prayers continue to form us, and the Spirit poured out at Pentecost continues to empower us. Thank you for being here to tend to the work of Christ's church. May you be filled with joy and with the Holy Spirit!

As I did last year, I will conclude my report with a slide show of some of the places where I've been over the past year: scenes of the Central/Southern Illinois Synod.

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
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Assistant to the Bishop Report to the Assembly

Pastor Kenneth Sandlin

I began serving as an Assistant to the Bishop almost one year ago. On July 1, 2014 Pastor Ron Moorman handed over files, keys, and his vast store of knowledge; and I wondered how long it would take for me to get settled in my new position. There were a few bumps and glitches when I began, but with Cindy and Glenna's help, some phone calls to Ron, and guidance from the Bishop and other assistants; I have learned the lingo, navigated the computer and settled in. I enjoy what I do, and I look forward to whatever possibilities each new week will bring. Time goes quickly. Typically, I'm in the office from 9am until 4pm on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays. I also visit with councils and call committees to explain the various steps of the call process; and, on Sunday mornings, I am privileged to join congregations, in my area of the synod, for worship.

The Call Process occupies most of my time. Everything is done on computer now. When congregations are vacant and seeking a pastor, they complete and submit a Ministry Site Profile on the ELCA website. When pastors feel that God is calling them to a different congregation or ministry, they also login to the ELCA website and complete and submit a Rostered Leader Profile. Whenever a pastor submits an RLP which names our synod as a synod of interest, we receive an automatic email notification from the ELCA. Some profiles are promising and we follow-up with the potential nominee, vorking to find a congregational match. Others, for various reasons, don't fit the current needs of vacancies in our synod and are set aside. As I type this, we have 21 congregations or yoked parishes who are involved in the call process; seven have received nominations and are interviewing, three have all their paperwork completed and are waiting for a nomination, and the eleven remaining are at various other points. Of course, the numbers change quickly, and by the time you read these words, they will have changed again. But despite the long journey and the uncertainty that congregations and pastors often feel, one truth remains . . . we continue to trust that God will call pastors to all of our congregations, and will provide calls to all of our pastors.

Candidacy is also one of my staff responsibilities. If a member of a congregation wants to learn more about candidacy and the call to become a pastor; I meet with them to share information, hear their story and answer their questions. If they discern that they are being called and enter candidacy, they maintain a close relationship with the candidacy committee who guide them through study, internship and on to ordination. The number of candidates from our synod, who are currently on their road through seminary, is low. This is a direct invitation to each one of us – encourage potential students in your congregation to consider the pastoral ministry.

The third part of my assistant to the bishop's role is visiting with congregations and pastors and worshiping with them on Sunday mornings. Not only do I bring them greetings from the Bishop, the synod staff and all the congregations of the synod; but I also work to provide a personal connection, a face and a voice, to strengthen the bond and the communication between us. Please let me know if you have any questions; and thanks once again for this opportunity to serve.



Assistant to the Bishop Report to the Assembly

"As the Father has sent me, I am sending you." It is a privilege to be sent on a mission through the Central/Southern Illinois Synod to proclaim the good news of Jesus Christ. Thank you for this privilege. Welcome to our new staff members: Pastor Ken Sandlin and Pastor Maureen Stein.

I am a part-time Assistant to Bishop Roth relating to congregations in the Northern and Northeast Conferences. I am considered deployed staff, living in Bloomington, so I can visit most congregations in one hour. I drive to the synod office in Springfield once a month to meet with Bishop Roth and the other assistants. This arrangement is working well.

My general duties include the following: read Rostered Leader Profiles, preach in one congregation a month, attend monthly conference meetings and text studies, relate to the Lay and Professional Leaders Subcommittee, conduct initial "Call Process" meeting in the Northern and Northeast conferences, and attend synod council meetings.

In visiting a congregation each month, I try to establish a closer relationship between each congregation and synod. I appreciate the warm hospitality I have received. I have almost completed visiting all 50 congregations.


Pastors seeking a call in a different location fill out a Rostered Leaders Profile (RLP). I read the RLPs relating to our synod, respond to them and make recommendations to Bishop Roth and Pastor Ken Sandlin. There is a shortage of RLPs.

The Lay & Professional Leaders Subcommittee meets through tele-conference calls. We completed a "Resource Guide for Clergy Renewal (Sabbatical) Leave" which is posted on the synod website. In addition we have revised the Compensation Guidelines. For 2016 we are recommending maintaining the current salary schedule because of the increase cost of Portico Health Benefits.

One of the most exciting activities of the Northeast conference is planning for a possible geographic parish. Eight congregations are involved: Community LC, Cornell; Trinity LC, Chenoa; Trinity LC, Fairbury; St. Paul LC, Forrest; St. Peter LC, Dwight; St. John LC, Anchor; St. John LC, Sibley; and American LC, Gibson City. Dedicated representatives have met for two years to find ways to do ministry together following the example of the Wartburg Parish. Many of these congregations are holding joint catechism classes and senior high youth activities. Thank you to Pastor Bob Dealey and Pastor Tom Krieger for their leadership.

I had the privilege of attending the ELCA Assistants to Bishops Gathering, February 26-March 1 in Jacksonville, Florida. It was an excellent Gathering with Dr. David Lose as the main speaker and Bishop Eaton preaching at the opening worship service. I also benefited from networking with other assistants.

With the warmer spring weather I am preparing for "Pedal for a Purpose." Last year we raised money for Lutheran Campus Ministry in Illinois and this year for our companion synod in Madagascar. Thank you for your support and please pray for safe biking.



Assistant to the Bishop Report to the Assembly

Pastor Wayland Middendorf

I serve as synod staff liaison for the Social Ministry, Justice and Advocacy Committee, the Global Mission Committee, and the Synodically Authorized Ministry Subcommittee. Another area of responsibility is to visit congregations and conference gatherings in the East Central Conference, Southern Conference and the I-70 portion of the West Central Conference. I also serve as the contact person for one closed congregation (Trinity Alton) until the real property is disposed. Disposal of the property has been concluded for Immanuel Cairo.

Social Ministry, Justice and Advocacy reviews grant requests and designates a monetary amount to each grant that is approved. The amount is based on the funds available, number of grants received that meet the criteria, the need and what the impact might be. This year we had four grants (Sola Gratia Farm, Youth Advisory Council, Karios and Sheep). We approved all four for a total of \$3,871.58. The committee will have a member join the World Hunger Web-Ex on the third Tuesday of each month so we can be more aware of needs and make more information available for the congregations in our Synod. We are also looking into ways we can become more involved in advocacy issues in our synod and communicate those issues to congregation leadership. The needs are many and great. Our hope is to educate and make more people aware of those needs.

Global Mission Committee made a successful visit to Madagascar in 2014 and the members of the team are available for congregations and other gatherings, to give a report of the highlights of the visit. Bishop Roth, Pastor Wayne Shelksohn the Committee Chair and myself, have quarterly Web-Ex conference calls with the other synods who also have companion synods in Madagascar and we annually meet at the Churchwide office to schedule visits and share information related to our companion synods. Bishop Roth has prepared a five-year plan for financial assistance with the Ft. Dauphin Synod and the Ambovombe Synod. The Central/Southern Illinois Synod has also requested a youth representative from Madagascar to attend the Youth Gathering in Detroit this summer.

Synodically Authorized Ministry (S.A.M.) Subcommittee is currently reviewing the S.A.M. Guidelines and plan to make some revisions by the end of this year to put us in line with the ELCA guidelines for Synodically Authorized Ministry and improve the education program. Our Dean of Education, Pastor Blake Duncan and I have been in contact with possible teachers and retreat leaders and have filled the positions for the fall, winter and spring classes for 2015-2016. We also have a couple of retreat opportunities tentatively scheduled as well for this fall and will add at least one additional retreat for either the winter or spring season of 2016.

I thank God for the opportunity to serve as an Assistant to Bishop Roth and I am grateful to all of you.

ELCA Director for Evangelical Mission

As the Director for Evangelical Mission (DEM), I am the staff liaison to the Mission Support and Stewardship Education Committee (MSSEC) and the New and Renewing Congregations Committee (NRCC).

Since the last synod assembly, the MSSEC has been engaged in two primary projects: the Macedonia Project and the Mission Interpretation Ministry. The Macedonia Project has focused on two areas:

- Synod congregations were invited to order a copy of the three-year stewardship resource entitled "First We Give of Ourselves" by the Rev. Kurt Nordby. The resource, which includes everything that congregations will need to conduct a stewardship campaign normally sells for \$60, but because of funding from a Macedonia Project grant, we were able to reduce the cost of the resource to \$15. Pastor Nordby will also lead a forum entitled "First We Give of Ourselves" at this year's synod assembly.
- Doreen Klages continues to serve as the Synod Coordinator for the Mission Interpreters Ministry, as we seek to recruit and train congregational representatives to serve as Mission Interpreters in their respective congregations. To date, training events have been held in five of the six conferences and a training event will be held in the Southern Conference in the fall, 2015. Mission Interpreters are persons, selected by the congregation, who share stories about what the Church is doing on the congregational, synodical and churchwide levels, with the hope that as congregational members hear these stories, they will be inspired and encouraged to undertake similar ministry projects. In 2014, Deb Rathert attended the annual churchwide Mission Interpreters' training event held in Chicago. The 2015 event will be held in New York City.

Two other items of note should be mentioned:

- The MSSEC is in the process of re-organizing. The Rev. Kathy Montira, who has served faithfully as the committee chair has accepted a call to a congregation in the Nebraska Synod and will no longer be able to serve on the committee; and the Rev. Jim Davis, who served as the clergy representative from the Northeast Conference, was elected as conference dean.
- The NRCC, under the leadership of the Rev. Ed Hudelson, co-sponsored with the Indiana-Kentucky Synod, a Transformational Ministry 2.0 training event, held at St. John's Lutheran Church, Bloomington, IL, January 8-10, 2015. Six representatives from the Central/Southern Illinois Synod attended the training event. As a result, NRCC members will present a forum at the synod assembly entitled "Discovering God's Purpose for You and Your Congregation". Plans are also being developed to introduce key congregational renewal concepts to congregations in the fall, 2015 at two different sites within the synod.

As the DEM, I have the privilege and opportunity to work with individual (or groups of) congregations on the development of missional/strategic plans. I am currently working with several congregational groups to develop an Area Ministry Strategy. These groups include eight congregations in the North east Conference; eight congregations in the Northwest Conference; four congregations in the Northern Conference; three congregations in the West/Central Conference; and two congregations in the Southern Conference.

. am also working with a number of individual congregations, who seek to clarify their understanding of God's mission. I am available to come and assist your congregation with the development of a mission plan. Please contact me to see how I might be of service to you.

Report of the Coordinator of Communications & Networking

Since the last synod assembly, the following communications activities have taken place":

- "Mission Matters..." a monthly electronic newsletter is sent to rostered leaders and congregations for congregational distribution.
- "For Your Consideration", a monthly electronic ministry reflection piece is sent to rostered leaders and congregations.
- "To The Point!", a bi-weekly e-mail blast with information about upcoming events and resources is sent to rostered leaders.
- In July, 2014, the first bi-weekly installment of "Did You Know That...?", was sent to rostered leaders and congregations. "Did You Know That...?" is a series of questions, the answers to which provide information about events and resources to congregational members.
- In March, 2015, the inaugural issue of "Church Connections" was sent electronically to congregational leaders. The initial issue featured information about events, resources and grant opportunities.
- Copies of pre/post-assembly fill-in-the-blank sample press releases were sent to congregations to submit to local media.
- A 2014 synod assembly summary was sent to congregations for distribution within the congregation. A 2015 synod assembly summary will be sent to congregations after this year's assembly.

The Central/Southern Illinois Synod webpage continues to be updated on a regular basis. Past issues of "Mission Matters...", "For Your Consideration", and "Did You Know That...?" are archived on the website. Thank you to Dean Haucap, Chris Wollesen, Cindy Koonce, and Pastor Ken Sandlin for their participation in keeping the website current. In an effort to help congregations with their ministry, new resources are constantly added to the site throughout the year. If there are any resources that you have found to be helpful with your ministry, please pass that information along to us. We appreciate your input. You are encouraged to visit the website at www.csis-elca.org

Frequently, the synod office is contacted to assist with the promotion of events of interest to synod constituents (e.g. Pedal for a Purpose; the 2015 ELCA Youth Gathering; Women of the ELCA). You may contact me at the synod office to see how we can assist you with your communications efforts.

We continue to expand our synod-wide email contact list. You may send us the names and email addresses of church council members, so that they may receive mailings from the synod office.

"Welcome to the Central/Southern Illinois Synod", a handbook for rostered leaders who are new to the synod, has been developed and is being distributed by way of cluster meetings.

Congregations are invited to send copies of their church newsletters (either electronically or by U.S. mail). We want to hear what you are doing and to share your stories with others.

He continues to serve at Lutheran Hillside Village and as an interim pastor.



The Northern Conference had a very successful "God's Work, Our Hands" service day in September, and organized a second spring event in April. This was our second year of service in this way, and we truly enjoyed working side by side and partnering with community groups like Habitat for Humanity, the Crittenton Center, Lutheran Hillside Village, LSSI, Southside Mission, Camp Kearney, The Morton Mission Mart, The Midwest Food Bank, and the Faith Lutheran Child Care. We had a great response from a number of area congregations.

Our Conference Youth Board draws together the gifts of several Youth and Family Ministers and numerous churches to provide exciting opportunities. The annual *Be Like Jesus* retreat draws in over 100 3-8th graders for a memorable weekend of service, music, and faith. The conference has continued working to organize *8 Days*, a cooperative young adult ministry for college-age students at Bradley University. They are largely unreached by existing churches. This year they are organizing plans and travel together for the National Youth Gathering in Detroit.

The Professional Leaders of the Conference meet on the second Tuesday of the month for worship, study and fellowship. Topics since summer of 2014 have included: YAGM and Missions, Means of Grace Discussion and sharing resources, Ministry of LSSI, Bishop's Colloquy, Ministry of MOSAIC, Claimed, Gathered and Sent – Being the Church, Clergy Sharing, and Pastoral Care for those with Dementia.

The Northern Conference is an active, positive, and collegial place to share in ministry in Jesus' name. We are blessed to gather and strengthen one another for service to the Lord.



Northwest Conference Report to the Assembly

Pastor Mike Thomas, Dean Trinity Lutheran Church, Macomb

The Northwest Conference is the second smallest of the Central/Southern Illinois Synod Conferences, both in number of congregations and membership, with seventeen churches spread out over Adams, Hancock, Cass, Scott, and McDonough Counties.

The Conference welcomed Rev. Brad Eidson (Trinity, Golden), Rev. Mauricio Vieria (Trinity, Carthage), Rev. Colleen Winkler (Grace, Virginia and St. John's, Bluff Springs), Rev. Pete Hagglund (Christ, Nauvoo and St. Paul, Ft. Madison, Iowa), and Rev. Richard Hertenstein (Immanuel, Carthage and Faith, Augusta) this past year. Pastor Richard Hertenstein is officially retired but serving in a special long term Pastoral Appointment Letter of Agreement, which is a fancy way of saying he is not really retired at all, providing pastoral ministry throughout the week, and leading worship at two congregations each Sunday. Just in case Richard was confused about what officially retired meant, he has also became an Interim Pastor at a nearby congregation. We keep asking Richard how retirement is, but he is too busy to answer. Pastor Pete Hagglund is serving a special two-point call under the auspices of both our synod and the Southeast Iowa Synod. Should the Mississippi River flood again like it did in 1993, Pete will need to be provided with a motorboat to make it to both services he leads each Sunday. (A canoe was originally proposed, but it was felt his vestments would get too wet.) Rev. Jill Flynn who had been serving as Interim at St. Peter's, Coatsburg bid farewell to us and moved to begin ministry in the Northern Illinois Synod.

We continue to make regular use of the Synodically Authorized Ministers residing in the Conference, with some S.A.M.s leading worship and providing pulpit supply regularly to congregations without a pastor. We thank S.A.M.s Brian Days, Larry Jahn, Muriel Paul, Ron Schultz, Dan Wilson, Shirley Arnold, Dave Poland, and Helen Pagel, Associate in Ministry, for all of their service. Some of the S.A.M.s have been called upon so often, that soon they may receive notification they have been placed on the inactive roster at their home congregation.

Several congregations within the Conference are exploring mutual ministry possibilities as discussions led by Rev. Robert Dealey pertaining to a Western Illinois Regional Parish are ongoing. The Conference Assembly was held in May, 2014 at Immanuel, Golden with a presentation made about planned giving by the ELCA Foundation.

The Professional and Lay Leaders of the Conference have monthly meetings from the fall through the spring, and topics this past year have included a book study, L.S.S.I., Congregational Constitutions, Care of Souls, *The Use of the Means of Grace*, and Bishop Roth joined us for a Bishop's Colloquy one meeting. Since last year's Synod Assembly we welcomed Pastor Terry Edwards, called to serve Prince of Peace, Mount Vernon. Members of the conference congregations gathered in September 2014 for assembly at Lutheran Church c the Cross, Metropolis, and in March 2015 for assembly at Peace, Steeleville. In the fall, we heard from Lutheran Disaster Response about the work they are doing following a tornado in Bridgeport and from Pastor Kat Montira about the synod's visit to our companion synods in Madagascar. In the spring, we had a Southern Conference music festival, with guest musician Daniel Schwandt, Cantor at Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago, and six of our congregational choirs or ensembles in attendance.

The conference's missional spending plan for the year includes gifts to campus ministry, the Hospitality Houses in Vienna and Chester, LSSI, the ELCA Malaria Campaign, and our companion synods in Madagascar; support for a student in the Synodically Authorized Ministry program; and funding of our spring and fall assemblies and our conference professional leader's retreat. We also have a designated fund to provide partial scholarships to every attendee from conference congregations to the Synod Youth Gathering at Rend Lake each February.



West Central Conference Report to the Assembly

The West Central Conference consists of thirty-four congregations stretching from Columbia at the southern end of the Metro-St. Louis area, north to Springfield and Jacksonville, west to Batchtown, and east to Shumway and Altamont.

Four members of the West Central Conference participated in the synod trip to our companion synods in Madagascar in August 2014: Bishop S. John Roth, Kris Roth, Jeannie Berg, and Connie Frankenfeld. The conference helped financially support the trip for the three lay members of our conference. Jeannie Berg and Connie Frankenfeld reported to our 2015 Spring Assembly about their trip.

The pastors of the West Central Conference met twice last fall.

In October we heard from Pastor Marlin Otte about the Marion Medical Missions and their shallow wells program. Marion Medical Mission seeks to share the love of Christ with the extreme poor in Africa by providing all in need with a sustainable source of clean, safe drinking water.

In November we had a lively discussion on the Means of Grace particularity as related to Holy Communion: invitations, age, and frequency, bread/wafer, wine/grape juice. We discovered that practices vary widely as do our theological perspectives on Holy Communion.

On February 12, 2015, Bishop Roth held his annual Colloquy with our conference at Mt. Zion in Litchfield.

The Conference Annual Spring Assembly was March 22, 2015, at Zion in Gillespie. In addition to the presentation about Madagascar we elected Deanne Holshouser to the synod council, Pastor Glen VanderKloot was re-elected as Conference Dean, Rose Moser was re-elected to the Synod Global Mission Committee and Pat Caley was elected to the Synod Mission Support and Stewardship Education Committee. Thank you to Connie Frankenfeld for her faithful service on behalf of our conference to the Synod Council. A free book exchange was also held at the conference assembly.

Three of the five Springfield congregations (Atonement, Faith, and Luther Memorial) are proceeding towards becoming a new blended congregation. The vote at each congregation to blend will be on Sunday, July 12, 2015. July 26, 2015, will be the last service of Atonement, Faith, and Luther Memorial. August 2, 2015, will be the first worship service together in Atonement's building. We are excited about this new congregation (yet to be named) that will arise.

Global Mission

The major project of the Global Mission Committee was the preparation and execution of the Trip to Madagascar to visit officials of the Malagasy Lutheran Church and our two Companion Synods, the Ft Dauphin and the Ambovombe-Androy Synods. To this end eight people participated: Bishop John Roth and his wife Kris, Pastors Ruth and Harlan Kaden, Pastor Kathryn Montira, Pastor Wayne Shelksohn, Ms. Connie Frankenfeld, Ms. Jeanne Berg, and Ms. Linda Ericsson. The trip began August 11, 2014 and we returned to the USA August 22, 2014. We also had visits to the US from the Young Adults In Global Missions Coordinators Rev. Austin and Tanya Probst in July and August 2014. We prepared a Mission Experience Survey for the synod. And had a member of the synod attend a Global Event October 30-November 1, 2014 at Wartburg Seminary.

The Vision of the Global Mission Committee: Who are we?

The C/SIS Global Mission Committee is a twelve member committee representing the six conferences of the C/SIS under the auspices of the C/SIS Synod Bishop, staff and Council. We are called to share in the Global Mission of the ELCA with Particular focus is on our Companion Synods in Madagascar.

Why are we here?

Now the eleven disciples went to Galilee, to the mountain to which Jesus had directed them. When they saw him, they worshipped him; but some doubted. Mission Support and Stewardship Education

This committee has responsibility for stewardship education; steward leader development; and encouraging mission support. In that vein, through the generosity of an ELCA Macedonia Project grant, the committee offered congregations the opportunity to purchase "First We Give of Ourselves", a three-year stewardship resource developed by the Rev. Kurt Nordby. This \$60 resource was available to congregations for only \$15. Pastor Nordby will be present at this year's synod assembly to lead a forum based on the resource. Congregations have until June 30, 2015 to take advantage of purchasing this resource at the discounted price.

Doreen Klages serves as the Synod Coordinator for the Mission Interpretation Ministry. Our goal is to recruit a minimum of one Mission Interpreter in every congregation. Mission Interpreters share stories about the ministries of the congregation, synod and the ELCA. It is a two-year term of service and Mission Interpreters learn a great deal about ministry from other Mission Interpreters. Training events have been held in five of the six conferences. The next training event will be held in the Southern Conference this coming fall. (Arrangements for the meeting are still pending).

The Mission Support and Stewardship Education Committee enthusiastically endorses the "Always Being Made New: The Campaign for the ELCA" which seeks to raise \$198 million in support of new and expanded churchwide ministries between now and January 31, 2019. Every synod congregation is encouraged to pick up a copy of an ELCA Campaign Information Packet at this year's synod assembly.

The Mission Support and Stewardship Education Committee is in the process of several transitions this year. The Rev. Kathy Montira, who has served faithfully as the committee chair, has resigned from the committee because she has accepted a new call out of synod. Her departure has created a vacancy from the Southern Conference. Pat Caley was recently elected as the representative from the West Central Conference and she will be serving as the group's recorder. The committee also has a vacancy from the East Central Conference.

As the committee seeks to fulfill its constitutional mandates, you and/or your congregation is invited to contact the committee for assistance in the areas related to stewardship education; steward leader development; and encouraging mission support.

New and Renewing Congregations

Who are we?

We are a committee made up of Christian members of this synod who are concerned about the future of this synod's mission and ministry for Christ. Currently our committee is made up of Pastor C. Edward Hudelson (committee chair), Connie Frankenfeld (synod council liaison), Pastor Micah Garnett, Suzanne Ligon, Pastor Matthew Kamprath, Pastor Kurt Hoover, Cindy Hindman, and Pastor Jan Worms. We work closely with Pastor Bob Dealey, the Director of Evangelical Mission for our synod.

Why are we here?

Within the synod's role to fulfill God's purposes, the New / Renewing Congregations Committee's mission is to equip the saints for ministry by building enthusiasm and support for renewal and to empower congregations to embody the vitality of faith.

What then shall we do?

During our third year as a committee:

- We continued to work to develop a network of congregational resources that will foster and facilitate sharing of practices which have proven helpful in fostering renewal in congregations within the synod. We are working with the Pastor Dealey to determine the resources and approaches that are available to assist the work of renewal within our synod.
- We now have seven people who have been trained in Transformational Ministry 2.0. The synod's transformational ministry team will be offering two introductory workshops for congregations who would like to investigate this method of congregational renewal. The workshops will be offered in the fall with one in the northern half of the synod and one in the southern half of the synod. These workshops will introduce the basic method by which congregational teams will be trained and will lead their congregations through this process.
- We are beginning to develop criteria for identifying congregations for transformation.
- We continue to utilize on-line resources for meetings, including SKYPE, conference calls, Drop Box, etc., so that we can be more effective stewards of the synod's financial resources and the investment in time for the committee members.
- Finally, we continue to strive for a culture of constant evaluation of the effectiveness of our efforts to learn from our failures and embrace our successes.

Social Ministry, Justice, and Advocacy

"Then the King shall say unto them on his right hand, 'Come, you who are blessed by my Father; take your inheritance, the kingdom prepared for you since the creation of the world. For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in, I needed clothes and you clothed me, I was sick and you looked after me, I was in prison and you came to visit me.' 'Verily I say unto you, Inasmuch as you have done it to one of the least of these My brethren, you have done it unto Me.'" - Matthew 25:34-36,40b

The committee continues into our third full year of work and have been quite busy. We have grant application requirements that provide more accountability of the use of funds and to assure that the congregations are actively participating in the ministries that they are requesting funds for. The theory for this change is that people are more willing to give if they know that the funds they are providing are being used appropriately and the idea of the grants is not only to provide a minimal amount of the funds needed for a project but to make the church a visible and viable part of their local communities.

If just monetary means are given, it is too soon that people forget who actually provided assistance and the hurch is still not a visible part of the project. This year we stipulated that two reports and pictures (when possible) from the grant recipients and the churches actively participating in the projects be submitted, This allowed us to know that our goal of visibility and viability are both being met, we require that several people in the congregation are actively participating in the projects that they are requesting funds for.

The grant application 2016 is available at the display table and will be available on the website following the Assembly. Again this year we will have a slide show with many of the photos of these grant projects in action

We also allocated money out of our committee expenses to provide stipends to help out conferences with some of the expense of speakers to aide their congregations in programs to bring more of the people from their congregations in from the community and reach out with programs that promote justice and advocacy in minimizing the effects of hunger and discrimination in our environments.

It is the goal of this committee not only to issue grants, but to be a source of contact for congregations as to how their congregations can be active participants of social ministry in their individual communities.

It is our goal to assist the bishop in showing the congregations that we as a church can be a viable and valuable asset to the communities in which we reside.

Sandidacy Committee

The Candidacy Committee of the Central/Southern Illinois is tasked with the responsibility for approving candidates to serve as rostered leaders in the ELCA. We oversee the process of preparation and formation of these candidates and partner with them, their congregations, seminaries, and the Congregational and Synodical Mission Unit of the ELCA. We seek to support and guide candidates through prayer and conversation as they discern God's call to ministry.

This committee meets three times each year to make entrance, endorsement, and approval decisions for candidates. This past year we established a three-year calendar so that candidates can be more aware of our meeting schedule and paperwork deadlines, particularly important since we are no longer working as part of a multi-synodical committee. This calendar is published on our synod website.

In 2014 we worked with a total of nine candidates. Five of them are distributed learning students with Luther Seminary and Wartburg Seminary. We approved one candidate for ordination; one candidate was endorsed; and two were granted entrance into the candidacy process.

One of our goals for the future is to offer more opportunities for discernment and community, for both candidates and those who are in the early process of discerning a call to ministry in the ELCA. We encourage congregations to raise up new leaders for ministry!

There were a number of transitions on our committee this past year: we thank Rev. Elaine Olson for her years of service as the chair of this committee, and Rev. Ron Moorman for having served as a synod staff representative. In August, I assumed the chair of the committee, and Rev. Ken Sandlin and Rev. Maureen Stein have served as synod staff representatives.

Leadership Support Committee Submitted by Mr. Robert Mueller, chair

The Leadership Support Committee had a productive year. The committee reviewed and revised the Compensation Guidelines. The major revision was to include more clearly information on the PORTICO Insurance program. By including worksheets, that helped explain the various plans and options, it will make it easier for congregations to apply cost guidelines. It was decided that the salary guidelines for rostered personnel would remain the same for 2016. Language within the document was also reviewed and revised where necessary.

The Committee also reviewed and revised the guidelines for pulpit supply. This area had not been looked at for several years. Increases for pulpit supply were approved and guidelines revised as necessary. The major undertaking of the Committee was to write a resource guide for congregations considering a sabbatical or clergy renewal program for called pastors. Synodically Authorized Ministry Submitted by Pastor David Hofer, chair

he Synodically Authorized Ministry (SAM) Subcommittee met three times since the last Assembly. We currently have thirty-three SAMs serving in the Central/Southern Illinois Synod. During the past year Synodically Authorized Minister, Marilyn Weingarz, who had served faithfully for six years, entered the Church Triumphant.

There are four students who have completed their course of study this spring, but because the last class is less than a week before the Synod Assembly, they were not able to be recommended to the Bishop for ser vice by the Synodically Authorized Ministry Subcommittee and have their interview with Bishop Roth. As a result, they will be recommended for service and have their interview with Bishop Roth after the Synod Assembly and recognized at a later date.

The next discernment retreat is scheduled for Saturday, September 12, 2015. The Introduction to Lutheran Theology is scheduled to begin Saturday, August 29, 2015. The Lutheran Confessions class is tentatively scheduled to begin Saturday, January 16, 2016. The location for all three of these events has not yet been determined. - Introduction to Lutheran Theology
- Introduction to Church History
- Introduction to Lutheran Confessions
- Students are also required to attend at least four retreats

During 2014-2015 the following retreats were held for the S.A.M.'s: Spirituality Retreat, which included spiritual practice and life-long discernment, led by Pastor Elaine Olson; the Gospel of Mark, led by Pastor Blak Duncan; and Catechism and Youth Ministry, led by Pastor Laura Kamprath and Mr. Jason Fisher.

The Preaching II class met at Immanuel Lutheran Church Lincoln. The instructor for this class was Pastor Elyse Nelson Winger. On May 2, 2015 a Catechism and Youth Ministry retreat (required) was held at Zion Lutheran Church Farmersville with Pastor Laura Kamprath and Mr. Jason Fisher leading this retreat.

2015 Report from the Central / Southern Illinois Synod Lutheran Youth Organization

Greetings on behalf of the C/SIS Lutheran Youth Organization (LYO).

I attend First English Lutheran Church in Peoria and enjoy participating in all the youth events throughout our synod and all of Illinois, as well as the youth group and the choir and praise band in my own church. I was elected in February at our meeting during the Rend Lake youth retreat. I feel very blessed to have this opportunity to serve all of you and the C/SIS LYO, and am very excited to get to work!

The LYO Board and Planning Committee has been very busy planning for and participating in synod youth events in 2014 and 2015. Junior, Senior and Post High youth and their adult leaders from all CSIS congregations are invited to participate in the two synod LYO retreats: at Rend Lake Resort in February, and Lake Williamson Retreat Center near Carlinville in November.

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

Grace and Peace in Christ! As I have been at St. Andrew's less than two months, following are a few *Interim Impressions*.

The most prominent feature of St. Andrew's Lutheran Church and Campus Center is its new larger than life banner across the top of its short, flat roof. Flanked by the ELCA and St. Andrew's logos, it reads "God's Work. Our Hands" and can be seen clearly when walking due west from the middle of the main quad of the university. This banner has surely put St. Andrew's on the map in a new and bright way.

In my first week in the office, at least five students and other congregational members stopped in to greet me. Location

location location, thought! On the edge of the quad, this location could not be more ideal for access and availability. Also in my first week, when temps were still low, other students and university staff not officially affiliated with us dropped in to keep warm while waiting for a bus, to use our bathroom, and to pray in our sanctuary. St. Andrew's is not only ideally located for our own people, it is also a place of welcome and shelter for others.

After my first Council meeting, a student offered to partner with me to plan a unique Good Friday service for which she had ideas. That week, a student who got involved with the congregation when he came here to study from China asked me to meet to talk about his desire to be baptized. *Vocation, vocation, vocation, I* thought! St. Andrew's knows to what it is called, its ministry is done for the sake of the Gospel, and the community welcomes others into a life in Christ. From quad day in the fall, where incoming students first make contact with us on the lawn as we give out food and freebies, to blessing seniors on their way in the spring, the year is packed with the ministries critical to university students: worship, prayer, music, Bible study, service both near and far, leadership development, exploration of the intersection between faith and science, a close and supportive community, laughter, a lot of food, and a lot of fun.


St. Andrew's is currently in the call process for a permanent, full-time pastor. Board President Roger Digges reports the following regarding that process:

"Pastor Elaine Olson transitioned from being the Executive Director of the Lutheran Campus Center/Pastor of Saint Andrew's Lutheran Church to enjoying retirement, effective December 31, 2014. LCC/Saint Andrew's was served part-time during January and February by the Rev. Barbara Ziah, and is currently being ably served full-time by Interim Pastor Amy Thoren. Members of the Board of LCC and Council of Saint Andrew's met with Central/Southern Illinois Synod Bishop John Roth on February 28, 2015 to clarify the call process. The center/congregation has already submitted its Ministry Site Profile, and the Board elected seven members to the Call Committee, six nominated by the Congregation Council. Graduate student Brian Gibbons, a member of the Council, chairs the Committee. The Call Committee, Council, and Board will all be involved in the process of approving a candidate before she or he is recommended to the congregation for a final vote. Should the congregation accept the recommendation, the Synod Council will issue the call, and a new chapter will begin in the Lutheran Campus Center/Saint Andrew's life together."

The ministry at St. Andrew's is exciting and vibrant! Many thanks to local congregations: Grace, Good Shepherd and St. Matthew's, for their support of this ministry. Thanks also to you, the synod, for your support and prayers. All are welcome to drop by the center and say hello or worship with us Sunday mornings at 10:30am.

2014 Annual Report Illinois Conference of Churches

The Illinois Conference of Churches (ICC) is a state-wide ecumenical organization of 27 member Judicatories of 14 denominations representing the Protestant, Anglican, Catholic, and Orthodox Christian traditions. The ICC is an ecumenical table that brings together religious leaders, judicatory staff, clergy, and lay representatives from the member churches for dialogue, deliberation,

and decisions to celebrate and make visible our sacred bonds of unity in Christ. The ICC is an institutional expression of the ecumenical movement, a vehicle for the church's mission in Illinois for bearing witness together to the gospel of reconciliation. The Illinois Conference of Churches website is located at www.illinoisconferenceofchurches.org.

Illinois Conference of Churches Mission Statement:

The Illinois Conference of Churches seeks to be an inclusive community of churches that celebrates and makes visible our sacred bonds of unity in Christ. We will do this by promoting an honest sharing and understanding of both our common and divergent theological convictions; and making public, prophetic witness to Christ's love for all people, particularly by addressing poverty and racism.

The Illinois Conference of Churches is comprised of one full time staff position – Laurie Vial, Executive Director. In addition, the ICC is comprised of teams of judicatory representatives and delegates who dedicate their time to furthering the mission and vision of the Illinois Conference of Churches.

Leadership Team – The Leadership Team governs the ICC as needed including all personnel matters and planning the ICC Annual Assembly. The Leadership Team is led by two co-chairs, at least one of whom is a Judicatory Executive. The chairs of the other four teams also sit on the Leadership Team. The Leadership Team consists of the following members Rev. Gary McCants, African Methodist Episcopal and Rev. Dr. Sheldon Culver, United Church of Christ – co-chairs; Dr. John Charlton, American Baptist - treasurer; Rev. Sharon Patton, Christian Church (Disciples of Christ); Fr. Kevin Laughery, Catholic Church; Dr. George Johnston, Presbyterian Church USA; Rev. Wally Carlson, United Methodist Church; Rev. Megan Dean, United Methodist Church; E. Garnet Fay, Society of Friends and Rev. Galda McCants, African Methodist Episcopal.

Public Policy Team – The Public Policy Team (PPT) takes a leadership role on public policy issues that impact ICC member judicatories. The team is vocal on concerns primarily before the Illinois General Assembly and Congress. The team carries out the portion of the ICC's mission statement, "to make public, prophetic witness to Christ's love for all people, and to address in particular, issues of poverty and racism." It is this part of the mission statement that guides the PPT's efforts as it works in consultation with the ICC's Leadership Team and the Illinois Christians Encountering Racism (ICER) Team. The Public Policy Team consists of the following members: E. Garnet Fay, Religious Society of Friends - chair; Robert Gilligan, Catholic Conference of Illinois; Rev. Gary McCants, African Methodist Episcopal Church; Rev.

Michael Winters, Presbyterian Church USA;. Rev. Jim Nolan, United Church of Christ and Rev. Dr. John Rickard, Presbyterian Church USA.

Racism (ICER) Team is a ministry focused on dismantling systematic racism and building bridges to racial wholeness within churches, institutions, and communities. ICER implements its mission by offering training to members within the ICC network of churches as well as to the community. The ICER Team consists of the following members Rev. Kevin Laughery, co-chair, JCL, Catholic Church; Rev. Galda McCants, co-chair, African Methodist Episcopal; Rev. Dwight Bailey, Christian Church (Disciples of Christ); Rev. Mark Harkness, United Methodist Church; Martha Herrin, Christian Church (Disciples of Christ); Rev. Don Jones, African Methodist Episcopal Zion Church Rev. Jim Nolan, United Church of Christ; Rev. Megan Dean, United Methodist Church and Rev. Christine Hopkins, Episcopal Church.

Annual Assembly Forum— The Annual Assembly Forum Team plans and implements a forum annually to engage denominational representatives and judicatory executives in meaningful dialog at the Annual Assembly. Robert Flannery, Catholic Church and Marianne Stowers, Christian Church Disciples of Christ

Annual Report to the Central Southern Illinois Synod (CSIS)

Dear Friends in Christ,

We give thanks to God for a blessed year of ministry in 2014! Lutheran Outdoor Ministries Center (LOMC) serves the three synods in our state. This year, more than 10,000 guests came to our 640-acre site near Oregon, Illinois. Over 170 ELCA congregations sent and supported youth and adults to our camp for immersive Christian leadership development, learning God's word, growing in healthy self-esteem, strengthening faith in Jesus, bonding with fellow believers, and building stronger connections to their home congregations. People enjoyed congregational retreats, summer camp, outdoor education, confirmation retreats, family reunions, concerts, volunteer work events, Autumn Fest, adult enrichment programs, trainings, and much more.

A wonderful, devoted team of 32 youth ministry staff shared God's love with over 1,000 campers in 32 unique summer programs. In addition, "Vacation Bible Camp" teams led Vacation Bible Schools at six churches, with praise songs, games, Bible studies and camping traditions for over 200 more kids. Bringing new campers this year was Harry Potter Camp, where kids had fun with selected themes, language, and characters from the popular books while learning about the real-life Biblical message of God's grace, given to us through Jesus Christ.

This year marked the 40th year of God's work at LOMC! Our annual "AutumnFest" welcomed over 400 people for family activities including hayride tours, food, games, worship, and Zip-Lining. The camp community was especially honored by the attendance of our three Bishops; each played an important role in the day. Bishop John Roth presided at our 40th Anniversary Worship Service, where those gathered gave thanks for the Holy Spirit's workings in people's lives through scripture, relationships, and the natural surroundings at camp. The event celebrated hundreds of thousands of lives touched by LOMC over the years and the future gospel work to which we are still called.

Financials were slightly lower this year, along with summer attendance and gifts to the annual fund. Three sources account for approximately 60% of income: summer camp, outdoor education classes and retreats. Synod grants, congregations, individual and Thrivent Choice donors account for another 32%. The remaining 8% came from land rental fees and donations for designated capital projects. Expenses in 2014 were \$24,000 more than in 2013. We are grateful to be financially stable with plans for growth in the coming years. LOMC practices faithful stewardship of resources including money, land, and people, as we strive to strengthen God's love among all our guests.

We are excited that awareness is now growing among congregations about the powerful impact of a modern Lutheran camp experience. Looking to the future, we are optimistic in adapting our programs to the evolving needs of the Church and world, while exploring new retreat program paradigms and unreached populations with a renewed focus on facilitating vibrant faith formation through intergenerational ministries. Gifts to Campership funds allow us to continue our policy that no child is ever denied a summer camp week due to family finances. While cross-denominational trends in America show church attendance in general continuing to decline, this underscores the

vital need for LOMC as a stronghold of life-changing relational ministry, and a "springboard" where people are equipped to more actively participate in the life and ministry in their home churches.

Facility updates this year included work in the hilltop and maintenance areas. Several old trailers, two storage buildings, and an abandoned house were removed, with the scrap metal recycled. We solidified plans to improve the hospitality and appearance of the administrative building where guests are welcomed, including a more accessible restroom. Tiles in the Dining Hall, retreat buildings and office kitchen were repaired. On Memorial Day Work Weekend, about 150 volunteers helped to clean, make repairs, and clear trails for summer camp. We also made plans for the John Califf Memorial Garden, which will brighten the area with a beautiful park-like landscape in front of the Dining Hall. John was Interim Director of LOMC, later serving faithfully as Development Director until his passing in 2013. Thanks to all our volunteers of time and resources for helping LOMC to be a more clean, safe, beautiful place in which people connect the Word of God with the world of God!

In the spring of 2014, LOMC installed the longest single-span Zip Line in the Midwest – almost a quarter mile long! The Zip Line was provided by the family of Rev. F. Leonard ("Len") and Carol Peterson. Over a thousand people have now experienced it, including all three Bishops! Hundreds of summer camp youth, as well as church retreat groups including a WELCA group with a few members in their 80's, took this tangible "leap of faith" this year at camp.

LOMC continues its partnership with Freedom Lutheran Church, a Mission Congregation under Development, by providing Sunday worship space in the Ragnar Moline Dining Hall at no cost.

We recently assembled a team to design a new Family Camp for Lutheran pastors' families with children or grandchildren who have Autism Spectrum Disorders. The Family Camp will take place August 6-9, 2015. More details will be coming soon.



For high school senior Kaitlyn O'Brien, this wasn't her first time at summer camp. Yet Swing Choir Tour (SCT) offered big surprises to even this seasoned LOMC camper.

"I've been going to LOMC since I was in 3rd grade," Kaitlyn explained. For her, the experience was fun, but it was more than that. SCT proved to be a way to carry the joy of camp life – the joy of Christian community – out into the world.

"This might sound cliché, but it's what I really feel – I like seeing the audience's faces, actually touching people with a gift that God gave me. I like the effect of it, what it did to people, sharing God's love through music."



LOMC was blessed with a new Zip Line donated by the Peterson family in remembrance of their parents, Rev. F. Leonard and Carol Peterson. "Peterson's Passage" was installed and tested by ABEE, Inc. in April. In early June, it opened after a 2 -day training and soon campers. grandparents, youth leaders, pastors, bishops, and many more have experienced Peterson's Passage. This 1200-foot Zip Line only takes 30-45 seconds to ride, but it is awesome. The participant has nothing to do but enjoy the ride, as Peterson's Passage has a self-regulating braking system. This means that there is a magnetic force that calculates the rider's weight and speed allowing them to arrive at the landing in a smooth, comfortable fashion. Many have gotten a second ride and it is really neat to see them go "hands free" just trusting the system. A Program Retrospective

The program department was busy this year. I manned the helm, with assistance in the retreat (off) season from Jarrett and during the summer from JD and Nicole.

Summer is what most people think of when they think of LOMC. This summer was definitely

an exciting one. In honor of our 40th anniversary, I resurrected a theme that had been written by Pastor Jack Swanson in the 1980s, *God Doesn't Own a Cookie Cutter!* This theme focused on the diversity of not only us as humans but the diversity that can be found in our

natural world. The theme verse was **Ephesians 2:10**: ¹⁰ For we are God's workmanship, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do. Each day we focused on a different aspect of diversity.


During the nine weeks of summer we offered 39 different themes. 372 campers came to the Bible camp side of the shop this summer. We also hosted 175 Faithworks (Confirmation) campers, 55 4-H campers, 35 TTT campers, and 30 campers from Hephzibah in Chicago. All of these youth (and adults) found God's word and leading with the assistance of our 30 capable staff members. In addition, the youth and adults at 8 churches experienced camp through our Vacation Bible Camp.

One special group of campers we have every summer are our Thekans. These are high school campers who come to camp for two weeks. These campers spend the first week learning all about being a counselor, how to lead Bible studies, teach songs, and where to find the cool stuff campers like to see. The second week they are paired with a counselor and are mentored as they practice the stuff they have learned. Twenty youth successfully completed the program, and I look forward to the time when they become full counselors.

We tried out two new themes this year. The first was experiencing camp for those entering first through third grades. I have watched these campers in the past, and by Wednesday they are exhausted – but in a good way. And for many of these campers this is the longest amount of time they have been away from home, so sometimes homesickness can happen. For this reason, we decided to have

these campers come on Sundays like everyone else but go home on Wednesday after lunch. It was a successful program and will be continued in the future

The second new theme was Harry Potter/ Hogwarts Illinois Week. For this week, Nyssa and I turned the entire camp into Hogwarts Illinois. Campers upon arrival were sorted into houses (Califf, Pederson, Hawkins, and Swanson) and given buffs to represent their house. They worked all week to earn points for their house through various tasks. Each house had times for flying (Zip line), herbology, care of magical creatures (honeybees), and Religious Studies (Bible Study time each day), as well as doing the usual camp fun. Every camper and staff member spent Thursday night camping out on the prairie and competing in the guad wizard tournament. For most of the campers and staff this was a definite highlight of the summer and I (Headmistress Huston, as I was known that week) have made plans to resurrect it again.

Our summer is bookended by outdoor education (OE). This is a small but mighty part of the portfolio. The groups come out to spend anywhere from one day to three days experiencing all things LOMC. Some highlights of OE are our indoor beehive (and the corresponding class), managing to get your whole group over the teambuilding course's 10-foot wall, and of course seeing the amazing amount of stars without all the light pollution that folks from the city deal with. Approximately 500 kids and adults spent time in OE in 2014, "Learning Outdoors, Making Connections (LOMC)."

ACA, but have the added bonus of prayer support from other camps. It means a great deal to us when someone from the CCCA board calls before their meetings and asks for prayer requests.




2014 Counselors of the Year

2014 Financial Report in Review

Past and Future

We are thankful to report another successful season of *your* many ministries at LOMC. In 2014, we heard countless stories of life change, Christian leadership development, new personal connections, and strengthening of faith in Jesus, for thousands of guests and campers.

Summer camp numbers were down this year, as well as gifts to the annual fund. Following a long-term trend in all Christian denominations, church goers are decreasing in numbers and many are less involved with their home churches. This underscores the vital need for LOMC as a stronghold of life-changing relational ministry and a springboard for campers (of all ages) to re-engage with their home congregations.

As we look to the future, we aim for growth for the sake of the Church – both physically as your camp facilities develop and improve, and constantly in the quality and effectiveness of your camp program. Toward this goal, the LOMC Board, staff and constituency are gearing up to "Restore and Refresh" key parts of the camp. Your important prayers and gifts to God's work here will make the difference. Thank you for your continued partnership in this work.


Income

The 2014 LOMC budget was nearly \$800,000. Where does the money come from? How were those dollars spent? A look at the income and expense graphs tells the story. LOMC is fortunate to have very diversified sources of income. Our guests at summer camp, retreats, and outdoor education account for 60% of the annual income.

We are very grateful that another 32% of LOMC's annual income comes from our donors, congregations, synods and Thrivent Financial making

it possible for LOMC to charge an affordable rate for retreats and summer camp. For example, the base registration fee for a week of summer camp is \$380, but the actual cost is more than \$500 per camper. This marvelous balance of multiple income sources allows LOMC to continue a policy of not turning away any child for economic reasons.

The final 8% of LOMC's total income came from land rental fees and money donated for capital projects.




2014 Financial Report in Review... continued Expenses

that made it possible for LOMC to purchase a new snow plow, demolish and clean-up the Barber House, remove the old trailer and replace the pool pump.

Central/Southern Illinois Synod Annual Report from Lutheran Social Services of Illinois

Dear Valued Partners in Ministry:

As you read this annual report of the activities of Lutheran Social Services of Illinois (LSSI), I am nearing my year anniversary as the organization's Chief Executive Officer, which I began on October 1, 2014.

The work of Lutheran social ministry has been a part of my vocation for much of my career—behavioral health, seniors, child welfare, and persons with disabilities. LSSI's programs go beyond service to others—our staff builds a strong trust with our clients, who in turn invite them into their lives. That's an amazing privilege to happen on a daily basis. This reflects the tradition of our shared Lutheran fellowship—loving our neighbor and welcoming the stranger.

This is an extraordinary time for human services. Amidst the uncertainty and challenges that our state faces in terms of budget constraints that impact our organization, we persevere and work diligently to navigate the realities of our economy, and evaluate and make adjustments to ensure we make the most of our resources to serve people in need.

At the same time, I can't think of a time where there has been such significant national momentum in terms of healthcare reform, child welfare reform, and the focus on a person's wholeness and sense of community. This is what we, with your partnership, are about at LSSI; helping others realize their hopes and dreams, to integrate with community, to maintain independence, and have the opportunity to make personal contributions.

Before I highlight LSSI's program accomplishments from last year, I'd like to tell you a bit about the *people* we have the privilege of serving. LSSI served one in every 176 people in Illinois last year, or a total of 73,000 people, from infants to senior adults. More than 80 percent of our clients report an annual household income under \$15,000, compared to just 12 percent of all Illinois households. Nearly half of our clients have an annual household income under \$5,000.

LSSI is the largest provider of foster care services in Illinois with 13 sites statewide. Approximately 10 percent of Illinois children under the guardianship of the Illinois Department of Children and Family Services (DCFS) are served by LSSI.

The critical services Lutheran Social Services of Illinois provides assist our state's most vulnerable residents. Here are a few program highlights from LSSI's last fiscal year:

• LSSI's Intouch Home Care services allowed more than 2,000 seniors to age in place, maintaining independence and dignity. LSSI's Intouch Services offers an alternative for living in a nursing home. Home care workers come to seniors' homes, assisting with light housekeeping, meals, personal hygiene, and companionship.

- At LSSI's 21 affordable housing communities across Illinois, 1,692 low-income seniors and adults with disabilities were able to live in their own apartments.
- LSSI served 2,513 children in foster care statewide; 184 of those children were adopted, finding forever homes. Additionally, our Intact Family Services provided crucial support for 902 parents and children at a crucial time in their lives when the children were found to be at-risk for abuse and neglect.
- As part of our Prisoner and Family Ministry, LSSI expanded its programming for previously incarcerated men and women—returning citizens—with the establishment of Re-Entry Services in Rockford and expanded services in southern Illinois.
- LSSI served 2,559 clients with alcohol/drug issues in 2014. Our programs consistently outperform other comparable services in the region and state. We provide a full continuum of targeted services for individuals with alcohol/drug issues, beginning with medically-monitored detox, all the way through residential care and transitional housing.

LSSI works collaboratively with the ELCA and other Lutheran-based organizations to extend our reach to people throughout Illinois, through Lutheran Disaster Response, our regional disaster preparedness training, which helps congregations plan for and respond to disasters in their communities. Lutheran Advocacy-Illinois, the ELCA state public policy advocacy office, has been crucial in helping advocate for public policies that promote the importance of human services.

Lutheran Day, held April 14, was an important showing by Lutherans and other people of good will who came together to exercise our Christian vocation to speak out for justice and compassion for all people, and especially for those who are most vulnerable.

We are grateful for the Central/Southern Illinois Synod, along with the other two synods in Illinois, and your congregations that participated in this year's Good Shepherd Sunday on April 26. This is traditionally the day when ELCA congregations lift up their ministry through LSSI. Through your generosity, we raised awareness and support for LSSI's Lifebook program. LSSI's goal is to provide each foster child in our care with a Lifebook—a therapeutic "scrapbook" that allows the child to document their life journey and process the disruption in their home life.

LSSI wishes to express its gratitude to Bishop John Roth, and the following board members from the Central/Southern Illinois Synod who currently serve on the LSSI Board of Directors: A.J. Mike Schwindenhammer and Rev. Elyse Nelson Winger.

Our work is of great importance because it is an expression of the love of Christ, enabling LSSI to live out its mission to bring healing, justice, and wholeness to people and communities. We do our work in the name of the Central/Southern Illinois Synod and all of its people, and we remain grateful for your ongoing involvement and support.




Foster Care Services

LSSI is the largest provider of foster care services in Illinois with 13 sites statewide. Approximately 10 percent of Illinois children under the guardianship of the Illinois Department of Children and Family Services (DCFS) are served by LSSI.

We Provide Additional, Targeted Services to Foster Children in Our Care

Foster care provides a secure and caring temporary home for children removed from their biological family due to abuse or neglect. Foster home placement protects a child while working with the birth family toward the ultimate goal of returning the child home.

LSSI offers additional services for these children, including counseling and educational support. Every child in LSSI's foster care program receives a Lifebook—a fun and therapeutic tool to help foster children celebrate special milestones and understand difficult aspects of their lives.

Intouch Home Care

62% of individuals who entered into an LSSI alcohol/drug treatment program successfully completed it.



















Lasting Partnership: Central/Southern Illinois Synod

Now in its second phase, your continued support is helping reach local fisher folk to replace boats and equipment and provide training on alternative sources of livelihood, like seaweed production.

About the Mission Investment Fund

The Mission Investment Fund (MIF), a ministry of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, makes low-interest **loans** to established ELCA congregations, new-start congregations and ELCA-related ministries for capital projects.

Established congregations use MIF loans to renovate, expand or relocate. New-start congregations rely on MIF loans to buy land and construct their first church buildings. ELCA-related ministries use MIF loans for a variety of capital projects.

To fund these loans, MIF offers a variety of **investments** for congregations, their members, synods and ELCA-related ministries to purchase. MIF investments offer adjustable- or fixed-rate terms and earn interest at competitive rates.

The Mission Investment Fund is **financially strong and stable**, with a record of steady, controlled growth:

- With total assets of \$661 million and net assets of \$192 million at year-end 2014, MIF achieved a capital ratio of 29 percent—maintaining MIF's position in the top tier of well-capitalized church extension funds.
- At year-end 2014, loans for capital projects for more than 780 ELCA congregations and ministries totaled \$461 million. MIF investments by congregations, their members, synods and ELCA-related ministries totaled \$464 million.

Investments and Loans in the Central/Southern Illinois Synod

As of December 31, 2014:

- 5 Mission Investment Fund loans, with a balance of \$1,668,730, are at work throughout the synod.
- Investments in the Mission Investment Fund by 85 individuals, 44 congregations, 3 ministries and the Central/Southern Illinois Synod totaled \$5,509,862.

Dear Partners in Ministry,

Healthy, resilient leaders shape healthy, resilient faith communities. This ELCA core belief is referenced in guiding church documents, and explains the enduring partnership between ELCA organizations, their leaders, and Portico Benefit Services. As one community, we're called to strengthen ministry.

ELCA organizations are expected to provide sustainable livelihoods for their leaders, and give them time to tend their well-being. Leaders are expected to tend their well-being so they are able to shape healthy congregations in changing, often challenging, times. Portico delivers cost-effective benefits, resources, and inspiration, helping leaders use services and tools to strengthen their financial, emotional, and physical well-being.

This partnership comes to life in a story Portico shared during last year's Open Enrollment. Erik Heskin, pastor at Bethany Lutheran Church in Escanaba, Michigan, required an organ transplant in 2013. Supported by his congregation and the benefits it provides, Pastor Heskin is now reclaiming his role in parish ministry.

Yes, his care was costly — in fact, about 1% of members incur one-third of annual health claims. But on any given day, through illness or injury, any of us could find ourselves in Pastor Heskin's shoes. By standing together as a community, purchasing health care wisely, and maintaining healthy lifestyles, we're better able to shape resilient faith communities and afford quality care for leaders in need.

Last year, 7,085 ELCA organizations partnered with Portico to sponsor one or more leaders in the ELCA benefit program, honoring the ELCA's long-standing commitment to protect members and their families against the impact of aging, illness, injury, disability, and death. Since the ELCA's founding, the number of its pastors enrolled in the ELCA benefit program has remained above 90%.

This commitment was evident during last year's Open Enrollment. Ninety percent of sponsoring employers chose to offer the Gold+ health benefit option for 2015, despite an 11% health contribution rate increase triggered by higher than expected health claims. While this kind of increase isn't typical for Portico, it is typical in the marketplace. Since 2007, Portico's average health contribution rate increase has stayed well below the average U.S. employer rate increase, saving millions of dollars for ministry.

ELCA sponsoring organizations also partner with Portico to administer benefits efficiently. In 2014, we automated several manual processes and encouraged sponsors to save time and increase accuracy by paying their monthly bill online. Currently, 48% use this simple, cost-saving process, and we're encouraging the rest to take this stewardship step in 2015.

Annually, Portico invites health plan members and spouses to take stock of their health, and then take a small step to improve their emotional or physical well-being. In 2014, our members responded in force.

Eighty-one percent of ELCA-Primary health plan members took the Mayo Clinic health assessment, up from 77% the year before. This increase helped the number of sponsors earning the 2% discount on ELCA health contributions jump for the sixth consecutive year to 97%, saving the ELCA \$2.3 million collectively.

Even more impressive, over 51% of ELCA-Primary health plan members earned all their wellness dollars by completing last year's featured wellness activity, up from 44%. One result of these healthy steps: Among those taking the health assessment each year from 2010 to 2014, 5.4% are no longer at risk for poor nutrition, and 7% are no longer at risk for poor emotional health.

Other ways leaders stepped up their use of ELCA benefits in 2014:

- In an average month in 2014, 769 ELCA-Primary health plan members received the fitness center discount by visiting a fitness center at least eight times during the month an 11% increase from 2013.
- As of Jan. 1, 2015, 47% of plan members are now partnering with Portico to strengthen their future financial well-being by making pretax retirement contributions, up 8% from last year. Forty-eight percent of plan members who made pretax retirement contributions in 2014 increased their contribution amount for 2015.
- 955 sponsored members and 24 retirees purchased a discounted long-term care insurance policy as part of Portico's first-year offering.

To best serve ELCA sponsoring organizations and leaders, Portico routinely asks the ELCA community for feedback. In 2014, we gathered survey responses from members and sponsors, as well as input from our advisory committees, the Conference of Bishops, synod assembly participants, synod office staff, theological conference attendees, our own Live Well ELCA Facebook page, and the ELCA Clergy Facebook group.

Through this intentional listening, we improve our offerings. For example, after hearing a number of members request long-term care insurance, we used our collective purchasing power in 2014 to offer it at a discounted rate. Another example: Using Customer Advisory Committee feedback, we were able to streamline last year's Open Enrollment process, a clear benefit for time-strapped sponsors and members.

Portico continues to steward the ELCA investment program with efficiency and precision, carefully selecting managers and calibrating asset allocation to enhance the performance of the funds. In 2014, more than 70% of Portico's investment managers exceeded their benchmarks. This was not the case for most of the investment industry. Morningstar reported that fewer than 20% of U.S. stock mutual funds exceeded their benchmarks during 2014. What's more, our actively managed funds, with few exceptions, performed better than comparable mutual fund peer group benchmarks during the year — in some cases, by a wide margin. Importantly, this also holds for 10-year and longer time periods.²

Beyond the ELCA, Portico's ongoing involvement with multidenominational church benefit organizations like the Church Alliance continues to deliver value. When a federal district judge struck down the clergy housing allowance exclusion as an unconstitutional preference for religion under the First Amendment in Nov. 2013, Portico, as part of the Church Alliance, jointly filed an amicus brief urging the court to uphold the exclusion's constitutionality. Thanks, in part, to our effort, the U.S. "A few of our staff members petitioned our local gym to be on the Fitness Center discount list, and I can now continue my daily workouts (aka sanity sessions) and save money, too! As of Jan. 2015, members can access Mayo Clinic's new Healthy Living website directly from myPortico, and we intend to expand single sign-on to other health benefit partners later in the year.

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Report for 2015 Synod Assembly

Dear partners in ministry,

I am delighted to provide this brief report of our shared ministry in Region 5. As regional coordinator, I support the work of synods to address mission and leadership needs in your synod and throughout the region. Most of my time is spent working with synod candidacy committees. "Candidacy" is the term used to describe our process of forming and preparing people to serve as a rostered leader in the ELCA-either as a pastor, diaconal minister, associate in ministry or deaconess. Like the many faithful volunteers that serve on your synod candidacy committee, I am honored to accompany students, help them develop as leaders, and explore with them how God is calling them to service in the world. In my role as coordinator, I also provide training for synod staff and committees on the candidacy process, work in partnership with Wartburg Theological Seminary and Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago (our ELCA seminaries located in region 5) and act as a liaison for the region in the area of candidacy to the ELCA Congregational and Synodical Mission Unit.

This past year, the ELCA CSM unit has been working on revising our candidacy manual. This is a document for candidacy committees that describes the process and standards expected of those seeking to become an ELCA rostered leader. As part of the revision team, I have worked to listen well to the various partners in the region, and communicate our good ideas and input. At this time, the new proposed manual is being considered by both the ELCA Church Council and the Conference of Bishops. It is expected that our new candidacy manual will be available the end of 2015.

I am also a representative of the region in the ELCA assignment process. I work with your bishop and other synod staff to request seminary graduates for the region and into your synod for their first call. This work takes into consideration the needs of the whole church, the preferences of seminarians, and the particular needs identified within the region. Region 5 also convenes an annual mobility conference, and works with synods in region 5 to facilitate call possibilities beyond synod boundaries.

Region 5 gathers leaders for shared ministry efforts from time to time, including Global Mission network meetings, world hunger networking, churchwide consultations, bishops and bishop assistants meetings. It's been my pleasure to provide avenues for connecting your people-resources to one another for the sake of mission.

Another resource we share in Region 5 are the regional archives, housed on the campus of Wartburg Theological Seminary in Dubuque. Our archivist, Nancy Carroll, receives records from disbanded congregations in the region, maintains a database of congregational records and provides research assistance on requests for information such as copies of genealogical records or other historical materials. 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ELCA Synod Assemblies 2015

Greetings from St. Olaf College!

Since 1874, St. Olaf College has provided a distinctive education grounded in academic rigor, residential learning, global engagement, and our vibrant Lutheran faith tradition. Students work closely with dedicated faculty who challenge them to grow in mind, body, and spirit. In both the curriculum and the co-curriculum, they explore theological issues and are challenged to choose their vocations in light of this exploration. All St. Olaf students take two religion courses, one focusing on the Bible and the other on Christian theology, as well as a third course introducing Christian and other ethical systems. The Harry C. Piper Center for Vocation and Career assists students in discerning their vocations and preparing for their careers during their four years at St. Olaf.

The appointment of the Rev. Dr. Darrell Jodock '62 as Martin E. Marty Professor of Religion and the Academy, which began in Fall 2013, has been extended through the 2014-15 academic year. Dr. Jodock continues to engage faculty and staff in exploring the distinctive contributions of Lutheran theological principles to our educational practices and community commitments. In July 2014, following the departure of Dr. Paula Carlson to assume the presidency of Luther College, Dr. Jo Beld, Professor of Political Science and former Director of Evaluation and Assessment at St. Olaf, was appointed Vice President for Mission. In early August, St. Olaf also welcomed a new Associate College Pastor, the Rev. Katherine (Katie) Fick, to the College Ministry staff. A graduate of Augustana College (Sioux Falls) and Luther Seminary, Pastor Fick previous served as pastor of Hayward Lutheran Church and Trondhjem Lutheran Church in southern Minnesota.

In response to the recommendations of a Board of Regents Task Force on St. Olaf's Lutheran Tradition, the college is currently working to enhance both internal and external understanding of the ways in which that tradition enriches all that we do at the college. A recent contribution to that effort is the July 2014 publication of *Claiming Our Callings: Toward a New Understanding of Vocation in the Liberal Arts* (Oxford University Press), edited by L. DeAne Lagerquist and Kaethe Schwehn, in which fourteen St. Olaf faculty members across nine different departments reflect on their own callings as professors and their practices for fostering vocational discernment among their students. Finally, plans are well underway for the next St. Olaf Conference on Worship, Theology, and the Arts, scheduled for July 18-22, 2016 (stolaf.edu/cwta/).

We look forward to welcoming you to St. Olaf. Come to campus to join us at concerts, lectures, conferences, or summer camps. You can also visit the St. Olaf multimedia website (stolaf.edu/multimedia/) to join in a wide variety of live and archived streamed events, including daily Chapel and Sunday morning worship services during the academic year, the weekly Sing for Joy radio program, and vocal and instrumental concerts and recitals.

We encourage you to send students to St. Olaf, we thank you for your prayers and support, and we offer you ours as well.

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Dear Friends: March 2015

Augsburg College has focused this past year on advancing our Augsburg2019 strategic vision (www.augsburg.edu/augsburg2019), which states that, in 2019 (our sesquicentennial year), Augsburg College will be a new kind of student-centered, urban university that is small to our students and big for the world.

One of the most significant advancements toward that vision is the progress made in the past year in **fundraising for our newest academic building, the Center for Science, Business, and Religion (CSBR)**. In January, we announced a \$10 million naming gift—the second gift of this size in the College's history—which brings total fundraising for the building to more than \$40 million and puts us on track to meet our goal of raising \$50 million by 2016. The CSBR will house a number of the College's academic programs—including biology, business, chemistry, computer science, math, physics, psychology, and religion – and will support every student in their journey of vocational discernment and pursuit of careers in teaching, civic leadership, service to the church, scientific research, law, medicine, privately owned startup companies, and large corporations. At its May meeting this spring, the Augsburg Board of Regents will discuss timing for ground-breaking and construction on the building.

Augsburg also continues to gain national recognition for its work in community service and engagement. In 2014, Augsburg was one of four colleges in the country to be named a **finalist in the interfaith category of the President's Higher Education Community Service award**. The award recognized Augsburg for its institution-wide interfaith work, including the College's collaboration with the Interfaith Youth Corps, a group devoted to building the interfaith movement on college campuses; the work of the Augsburg College Interfaith Scholars, a group of Augsburg students who engage in interreligious dialogue and explore the religious diversity of the College, the Twin Cities community, and the United States; and an Inclusiveness Reading Circle, a group that supports interfaith intergroup dialogue.

In addition to the interfaith award, Augsburg also was the only Minnesota college or university named to the **President's Higher Education General Community Service Honor Roll with Distinction**. The Honor Roll recognizes institutions for exemplary, innovative, and effective community service programs. Honorees are chosen based on a series of factors, including scope and innovation of service projects, percentage of student participation in service activities, incentives for service, and the extent to which the school offers academic service-learning courses.

Two important stewards of the College's interfaith and service work are the **Bernhard M. Christensen Center for Vocation and the Office of Campus Ministry**. This past fall, the Rev. Mark Hanson '68 joined Augsburg College as a Distinguished Fellow in the Christensen Center for Vocation, working to advance the College's commitment to vocational discernment—one of the four core commitments named in the Augsburg2019 strategic plan—and continuing his international efforts on interfaith dialogue as it relates to peacemaking. Hanson's connections to Augsburg run deep, and he truly understands how Augsburg, as a Lutheran college immersed in an urban setting, helps students explore what it means to live and serve in a radically changing world. In Campus Ministry, Augsburg's chaplain to student athletes, the Rev. Mike Matson '07 (who also serves as football assistant coach and as a strength and conditioning coach), began his call this past fall at Bethany Lutheran Church. Matson serves Bethany half time and continues his half-time ministry at Augsburg, further enriching our church relationships in the Seward neighborhood.

As these initiatives and accomplishments show, Augsburg is truly living out its calling to serve our neighbor and is demonstrating the role and the impact of Lutheran higher education in the 21st century. We look forward to continuing this important work in 2015.

2015 ANNUAL REPORT TO THE SYNODS

Seeking Truth, Building Strength, Inspiring Service—Together. These seven, simple words are the Carthage mission statement. They serve as the foundation for everything we do here as we seek to educate young men and women. We proudly embrace our Lutheran heritage, even as we welcome all to our beautiful, lakefront campus. We challenge students, faculty, and staff to seek excellence in every endeavor, and we affirm that the privilege of an education carries with it the responsibilities of social awareness. We are, in short, *your* college.

But what *is* your college? Physically, Carthage comprises an 80-acre campus on the shore of Lake Michigan. The campus is in Kenosha, a city of 100,000 in southeastern Wisconsin—an hour from downtown Chicago, a half-hour from downtown Milwaukee. Intellectually, Carthage is more than 150 full-time faculty—no graduate assistants teach our students—with degrees from some of the most prestigious universities in the world. 91% of the full-time faculty have the terminal degree in their field. The average class size is 18; there simply are no large lecture halls on campus. Carthage was named a **Best Midwestern College** by *The Princeton Review* (2014), and a **Tier 1 National Liberal Arts Institution** by *U.S. News & World Report* (2014).

Your college has enjoyed a spectacular year, which simply challenges us to reach ever higher. Here are a few of the highlights of our work this year:

- When the present school year opened in September 2014, Carthage set an all-time record enrollment with 2,599 full-time undergraduate students. Thanks to the very hard work of our admissions officers, we were among the 13% of colleges nationally that reached their enrollment targets this year.
- Each year, some 800 adult learners enroll in undergraduate, graduate, or professional development classes at Carthage.
- We are good stewards of our resources. The College is on track to end this fiscal year with its 27th consecutive balanced budget.
- The endowment fund was at an all-time high of some \$82 million as of December 31. Still, this is well below the average of colleges our size, and well below what we need in order to truly support student financial aid and innovative academic projects.
- Phase I of the \$43 million renovation of our science facilities was completed in January 2015, and faculty and staff have moved back in to their new offices, classrooms, and labs. Phase II began even before Phase I was formally complete, and should be completed by June 1, 2015. Phase III takes place this summer, and will be completed by September 1, 2015. The project includes a major renovation of the 70,000-square-foot David A. Straz, Jr. Center for the Natural and Social Sciences, and creation of a new 35,000-square-foot wing to the south and east, embracing the Center's lakeside location. This will increase classroom and laboratory space by more than 40%, which is essential, given that more than 25% of Carthage students major in the natural sciences.
- As part of this renovation project, Carthage received the second largest gift in its history, a \$10 million grant from the Tarble Family Foundation of Los Angeles.
- Carthage is the new home for NASA in Wisconsin. Carthage was named the lead institution for the
 Wisconsin Space Grant Consortium, which funds education, research, and informal education projects
 through a national network of university-based Space Grant consortia.

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- After a lengthy process of research and preparation, Carthage launched a Bachelor of Science in Nursing program. The founding director of the program is working to satisfy all educational, regulatory, and accreditation requirements. We hope to welcome our first students this September.
- The American Institute of Physics (AIP) recently selected Carthage's Department of Physics and Astronomy for its new study on effective undergraduate physics programs. Carthage is among the best in the country at preparing undergraduate physics students for careers in STEM fields—science, technology, engineering and mathematics—according to the AIP. Carthage is one of six colleges and universities nationwide selected for the project.
- Over the past fifteen years, Carthage has invested close to \$200 million in new campus facilities. There is no deferred maintenance.
- The Higher Learning Commission of the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools has given Carthage high marks and granted reaccreditation without condition.
- The latest strategic plan is nearly complete. More than 125 faculty and staff members, and some 75 or so
 members of the greater community, have been working in conjunction with the Board of Trustees, which
 is fashioning its next five- and ten-year strategic plan for the College. The Board will approve the plan later
 this year.
- When it comes to critical thinking, problem solving, and written communication, Carthage seniors are in the top 11 percent nationwide among colleges and universities using the Collegiate Learning Assessment, a national tool administered at institutions across the country to assess their impact on student learning.
- Carthage is ranked seventh nationally for student participation in short-term study abroad by the Institute of International Education (Open Doors 2013 Report).
- Carthage students studied on five different continents during the 2015 January Term. The Carthage Choir
 went to Spain, and the Women's Ensemble sang in China. Students studied economics and business in
 South Africa; the tropical ecology of Costa Rica; religion and society in India; the economics and science of
 rural development in Guatemala; business and marketing in Sweden; and biology and geography in
 Nicaragua, among other J-Term trips.
- Carthage students volunteered their time and effort in thriving partnerships with the United Way
 campaigns in both Kenosha and Racine Counties, as well as Kenosha's Boys and Girls Club, Women and
 Children's Horizons, Shalom Center, and other non-profit agencies. Students also supported national
 efforts such as the ALS "Ice Bucket Challenge" (more than 75% of the incoming freshman class
 participated!), the Relay for Life, and Walk a Mile in Her Shoes.
- Finally, and most importantly, within six months of graduation, 95 percent of graduates report landing a satisfying career position or enrollment in graduate school.

The Lutheran concept that God gives us our vocations, that we strengthen them through the attainment of skills and knowledge, and that we use these strengths in the service of others, is essential to our mission, inspiring and leading students to find their own particular way in this complex world. Carthage is proud to be a college of the church, and proud to provide a challenging and rewarding liberal arts education in a Lutheran context. Thank you for your partnership with us!

The ideas and insights gathered in our listening process will shape our future vision for serving college students in the contemporary changing landscapes of congregations, faith communities, and ministry with young adults.

In January, we wished godspeed to the Rev. Dr. David Vasquez, a college pastor at Luther who accepted a call to serve as president of the Pacific School of Religion in Berkeley, California. Pastor Vasquez served as college pastor at Luther for thirteen years. We are grateful for his ministry with Luther students, faculty, and staff. We are pleased to welcome the Rev. Judd Larson (Luther class of 1974), Interim College Pastor, to Luther for the spring term 2015. Pastor Larson joins college pastors Michael Blair and Amy Zalk Larson on the college ministry staff this semester.

Every year, nearly 300 Luther students receive EPIC (Education Partners in Covenant) grants from their congregations—a wonderful affirmation of a young person's decision to attend Luther College. In 2014, these grants totaled \$260,000. Beginning next year, Luther's match of EPIC grants will increase 30 percent, to \$1,000 per year in support of a current student. This year our campus pastors and several faculty members have served as resource persons at synod events and assemblies on topics such as spiritual practices and contemplative leadership, men's spirituality, church music, and "greening" congregations. In February 2015, Luther partnered with Spirit in the Desert Retreat Center in Arizona to offer a "Blessed to be a Blessing" retreat focused on vocational discernment in the third chapter of life.

Wartburg College helps students discover and claim their callings connecting their learning with faith and values, their understanding of themselves and their gifts, their perspective on life and the future, and the opportunities for participating in church, community, and the larger society in purposeful and meaningful ways.

Enrollment

Fall 2014 enrollment at Wartburg College was 1,661 students. 10.1% are international students from a record 69 countries. 66.2% of our students are from Iowa, 8.2% are from Minnesota, and 6.9% are from Illinois. More than 25 Christian denominations and eight world religions are represented on campus, with 29.4% of the student body affiliated with the Lutheran church. The top five majors are biology, business administration, communication arts, elementary education, and music education, followed closely by psychology, engineering science, and fitness management.

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2015 Report to the Central/Southern Illinois Synod Assembly

Dear Friends,

We give thanks for the many gifts that you, the people of the Central/Southern Illinois Synod, send to the Lutheran School of Theology in Chicago (LSTC) and Wartburg Theological Seminary (WTS). We couldn't carry out our mission without

- the *financial support you offer* as individuals, congregations, and synods. Your support is the foundation for the economy of leadership formation in our ELCA.
- the *people you send who may become seminary students*. By saying to someone, "Have you considered being a pastor or another church leader? I think you have the gifts," you plant the seed of discernment. Seminaries rely on you to identify those gifts of leadership among people in your congregations and in your families and friendship circles.
- your *prayers and care for your seminaries and their students*. You encourage and inspire us in the work of forming leaders who are well-prepared to inspire others in living out their faith.

The Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago continues to fulfill its mission of forming visionary leaders to bear witness to the good news of Jesus Christ by:

- Sending out 55 students from six degree programs at the May 2014 Commencement. Half of our Master of Divinity graduates were in a call process or had a call in hand as of Commencement, and nearly all are now ordained and serving in congregations across the country.
- Launching a new curriculum to form leaders for a "public church" that offers a distinctive Christian witness in the world. The curriculum balances theological study with practical skills to build competencies in cultural context, spiritual formation, religious heritage, and ministerial leadership.
- Welcoming an incoming class of master's degree students that is 16% larger than last year's class. This is the third year in a row at LSTC that the entering class is larger than the previous year.
- Beginning the quiet phase of the seminary's second comprehensive campaign with a \$5 million unrestricted gift. In making this remarkable lead gift, the donors said they hope to encourage others to give generously to LSTC.
- Awarding 30 full-tuition scholarships to first-year and returning master of divinity students and providing scores of other partial-tuition scholarships to students in every year of their studies. Over 90% of LSTC master's degree students receive a scholarship from LSTC. Thanks to this financial assistance, total student borrowing has fallen a third year in a row and is at its lowest level in over a decade.
- Beginning research to identify pathways to lower seminarian debt, a three-year study made possible through a \$250,000 Lilly Endowment grant.
- Hosting dozens of biblical scholars and theologians from around the world at the Lutheran World Federation International Hermeneutics Conference at LSTC in September 2014.

Wartburg Theological Seminary continues to live out its mission of forming valued leaders for God's mission by:

- Sending out 46 graduates of degree and certificate programs as valued leaders to serve in congregations and ministries throughout the country and world. As early as July more than 75% of students were transitioning to their first call. The rapid move into calls points not only to the quality of our graduates but also to the church's increasing need for pastors and other leaders.
- Offering a Distributed Learning program that continues to grow with 17% of Wartburg degree students participating in this program. By successfully combining online coursework and oncampus intensive courses, the DL program has opened formation for ministry to gifted people who previously could not consider beginning theological education.
- Launching a new "Learning for Life: Seminary for Everyone" program to meet the everchanging needs of the church. "Learning for Life" is built on the core belief that theological education is for everyone. For more information about this exciting new learning initiative that includes online courses and learning events, visit our website at www.wartburgseminary.edu.
- Meeting the needs of diverse ministry contexts by providing a summer Spanish language intensive, a Master of Divinity Hispanic Ministry Summer Term, TEEM programming (Theological Education for Emerging Ministries) as well as a certificate in Hispanic Ministry at LSPS (Lutheran Seminary Program in the Southwest) in Austin, TX. LSPS is a program of Wartburg Seminary and Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago
- Providing 100% of eligible students with seminary financial support for their education as a result of generous gifts from congregations, individuals, and other organizations that provide financial support for theological education at Wartburg Seminary.
- Launching the public phase of the \$22 million *Engaging God's Future* campaign which seeks to strengthen the church through the formation of future leaders at Wartburg Seminary.
- Renovating ten single-family housing units for to improve energy efficiency. This project was made possible through donations and contributed labor from members of Nazareth Lutheran Church (Cedar Falls, Iowa) and from other individuals and churches of the Northeastern Iowa Synod.
