

## Gifted for Ministry

*Congregations of the ELCA are tasked with calling forth ministry leaders to be pastors and deacons. Congregations of the Central/Southern Illinois Synod hope that you will take an active interest in helping to call forth new ministers for the Church.*

### **Seminary Pathways**

Seminary education to become a pastor in the ELCA generally consists of an equivalent of three years of coursework, a unit of Clinical Pastoral Education and a twelve-month internship. Traditionally students were physically located on a seminary campus, with two years of coursework, a year of internship, followed by a final year of coursework. Now there are additional paths for moving through this formation process.

**Distributed Learning:** Most coursework is online with some on-campus coursework throughout the years. While full-time coursework is covered over a three-year period, students can extend the timeline based on life circumstances. A twelve-month internship falls near or at the conclusion of coursework.

**Collaborative Learning:** Students spend four years embedded in a congregation, working twenty hours per week with most coursework online and one week on campus each semester. Eighteen months of the four years will be a full-time internship.

**Wartburg 3+3 Accelerated Ministry Program:** This program includes three years of BA education at Wartburg College with at least one semester interfacing with Wartburg Seminary online learning. The three Wartburg Seminary years may be spent on campus with a twelve-month congregational internship or in a collaborative learning context.

**Trinity Seminary 2+2 Structure:** Two years of full-time on campus coursework and contextual education in congregations and two years of internship and continued online coursework, with some on campus coursework.
